This is not always the case, however, and many a middle-aged widow does happily solve her problem by marrying a middle-aged man with whom she has a beautiful friendship and a companionship that makes her last marriage happier than her first.

DEAR MISS DIX: I am a young woman unhappily married to a man who tries to dominate me in every way. We don't see things from the same angle and he treats me as if I were a child. I have to ask his opinion about everything I do, but he does as he pleases without consulting me. I have met a married man who is having identically the same trouble in his home. Nothing he does is ever right with his wife. For eight years he has been trying to make her the kind of a woman he wanted her to be, but has failed. We have fallen in love with each other. What shall we do, continue unhappily as we have been, or divorce our mates and marry and be happy? We both have children.

ANSWER: What makes you think that you will get along any more peacefully with each other than you do with your present mates? If you are imagining that you will not have to adapt yourself to a new husband and a new wife, even as you did to the old, forget it. Every living man and woman has his or her individual peculiarities and eccentricities of temper and temperament and general cussedness, and if you stay married you have to take 'em and like 'em.

So why not make the best of the life partners you have and preserve your homes for your children's sake? That a man is opinionated and likes to have his wife defer to him isn't a serious fault. Yankees Pull 6-5 Victory Over Cleveland

New York Yankees pulled a 10-inning 6-5 victory over Cleveland Indians Tuesday in a precedent-shattering affair that started by daylight and ended long after dark.

It started out to be an afternoon doubleheader, but dragged out more than six hours, with only one decision, under the new American League rule that permits the use of floodlights to complete certain games begun by daylight. It was the first time this rule had been invoked and the lights were turned on not once, but three times before the umpires gave in to the weather.

The Yanks were leading 4-0 at that stage of the third inning of the well-named "nightcap". This postponement will be played as part of a doubleheader today. As a result of the hard-earned New York victory, the Yanks crept closer to the league-leading Detroit Tigers, whose afternoon game in Washington, part of a scheduled day-night twin bill, also was rained out. Cleveland slipped into a tie with the triumphant Boston Red Sox for third place in the exciting pennant race.

The Yankee management later announced that it was sending a protest to League president William Harridge, who is in Washington, on the grounds that the game was called off before the field was in an unplayable condition. The Yankees said they would request that the game be continued from the point at which it was called. A crowd of 57,871 turned out for the affair that was turned into a farce by the elements. And a surprisingly large part of the throng still was on hand when umpire Bill Summers finally shouted "it's off" at 7:43 p.m. EDT as the fourth of a series of thunderstorms began drenching the field which had just been uncovered. The first game was delayed 27 minutes during the eighth inning, just after the lights had been turned on for the first time during a regular-season "day" game. There was a 55-minute interval between the first and second games and a delay of 60 minutes before the affair was called off. It was a long "afternoon" for everybody. Making the affair all the more painful to the defeated Indians.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 — (CP) — New York Rangers of the National Hockey League will open training Sept. 18 for their 25th season. It was announced today.

Thirty-nine players including all members of last year's team, which came within one goal of winning the Stanley Cup, will report to Neil Colville, the club's new coach, at Saranac Lake, N. Y. Colville, former Ranger defenseman and for two seasons coach of New Haven Ramblers of the American League, succeeds Lynn Patrick who is taking over coaching duties of Boston Bruins.

Among newcomers seeking berths on the 1950-51 Ranger squad are rightwinger Ed Kullman of Winnipeg, former Ranger who lately played for Providence in the American League; defenceman Norm Gustavsen of Timmins, Ont., formerly with Tacoma in the Pacific Coast League; Reg Sinclair of Saskatoon, both forwards up from amateur ranks. St. Foul Saints of the United States League, a Ranger farm club will join the Rangers at camp Sept. 25.

Preceding opening of the professional camp, the Rangers will conduct their annual eastern amateur school at Lake Placid, N. Y., from Sept. 12-16. A western amateur school now in progress at Winnipeg ends Saturday.
