

# Difficulties For Canada Seen Small By Comparison

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada may have difficulties to face but they are small compared to those of other countries, Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland said here Friday night.

Mr. Smallwood told the opening banquet of the 72nd Central Canada Exhibition that Canadian unity should start in the nation's capital and be focussed there.

"We Canadians must unite in our own great national capital. This must be the capital of every Canadian."

While people should retain loyalty to the heritage of their own provinces, he added, it should not exceed their loyalty to the nation.

"How can a part ever be as great as the whole?"

Mr. Smallwood said people in Newfoundland were proud to be Canadians when they entered Confederation 16 years ago, "and they are still proud."

**GREAT CHANCE COMING**

"But we are beginning to wonder recently at talk about the great change that is coming... about the trouble."

"When you are new Canadians like us, or have just come to Canada from other countries, you start to wonder about these problems."

"But if there are some problems to be solved, what is the country in the world that you'd exchange for Canada?"

"South Africa, Asia, Australia and New Zealand, Great Britain, the West Indies, all have some difficulties."

"And the U.S.—has the U.S. got fewer problems than we have got? Are they any easier greater future than we have?"

**BIKINI-CLAD STATUE DRAPED**

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Teen-agers battling to have a bikini-clad statue of a female covered claim a temporary victory.

The 17-foot statue, advertising a night club featuring bare-bosomed dancing girls, has been modestly draped on orders from the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

A band of teen-agers, led by Tamzon Feeny, 16, made a pre-dawn raid Aug. 5, hoping to drape the statue.

Tamzon's troops shot arrows, with string attached, over the statue and tried to pull a plastic sheet up to cover it. They failed, she said, because the string kept breaking.

Tamzon said alcoholic beverage control agents contacted her after the raid and agreed the sign was unconventional advertising.

The teen-agers next circulated petitions to gather more than 1,000 signatures of persons who thought the statue indecent.

Doug Pattillo, manager of the night club, said he received orders to drape the \$6,000 statue Thursday.

"Let's say the cover is tentatively permanent," Pattillo said. "We're going to fight it."

Tamzon, an honor science student, agreed the covering was only temporary and she, too, vowed to continue the battle.

The statue, mounted on a 25-foot pole, is clearly visible from U.S. Highway 80.

**Artificial Trees Cut Natural Sale**

KENTVILLE, N. S. (CP)—The sale of artificial Christmas trees in the United States has caused a 20-per-cent reduction in sales of natural trees to the U.S., John H. Noyes, extension professor of forestry at the University of Massachusetts, said here.

"For every poor quality tree that goes on the market the consumer may change to the other product," said Mr. Noyes, addressing a joint meeting of the Society of American Foresters and the Nova Scotia branch of the Canadian Institute of Foresters.

He said about 2,000,000 Christmas trees are shipped from Nova Scotia annually to United States markets.

**Stolen Kiss Ruled Crime**

ROME (Reuters)—Italy's Supreme Court has ruled, in a judgment made known Friday, that a stolen kiss, even if planted only on a girl's arm, is a crime.

It said a kiss is normally "a manifestation of sexual instinct."

The Supreme Court ruled as a penal offence the behaviour of a man who, "after having gone on his knees, implored a kiss which was not granted, but then succeeded in giving one on an arm of the woman, which he held tightly in his hands."

This episode was sufficient to condemn the man concerned, the court said.

In Italy, adultery and kissing in public are crimes.

# Corporations Have Decided On Form Of Pension Plans

OTTAWA (CP)—The CNR's new pensions scheme, which integrates its own plan with the Canada Pension Plan, probably will not greatly affect plans in other Canadian industries, it was reported Friday.

Officials here said most major corporations have already decided what form their pensions will take.

Under the CNR scheme its own pension and the Canada Pension Plan will be blended with employees contributing about 6½ per cent of their earnings.

W. T. Wilson, CNR vice-president for personnel and labor relations, said at Montreal the plan will increase pension payments and at the same time maintain contributions at a rate lower than would apply if the CNR and government plans were "decked" — placed one upon the other.

**WON'T INTERFERE**

The CNR will not interfere with the preference of general chairmen of employees unions for the decked plan. However, it will make the integrated plan available to about 11,000 non-union employees.

Sources here said the CNR plan could put pressure on the CPR, whose operating employees want the "decking" principle followed. The pension is not part of the union contract and is therefore non-negotiable, and the company can do as it wishes.

Benefits under the Canada Pension Plan will accrue gradually starting Jan. 1, 1966, and will affect about 70,000 hourly-rated union members in the CNR as well as salaried non-union employees. The return will reach a maximum \$104.17 a month after 10 years of contributions.

CNR will give no estimates of benefits a worker would receive because there are "so many technicalities and variations."

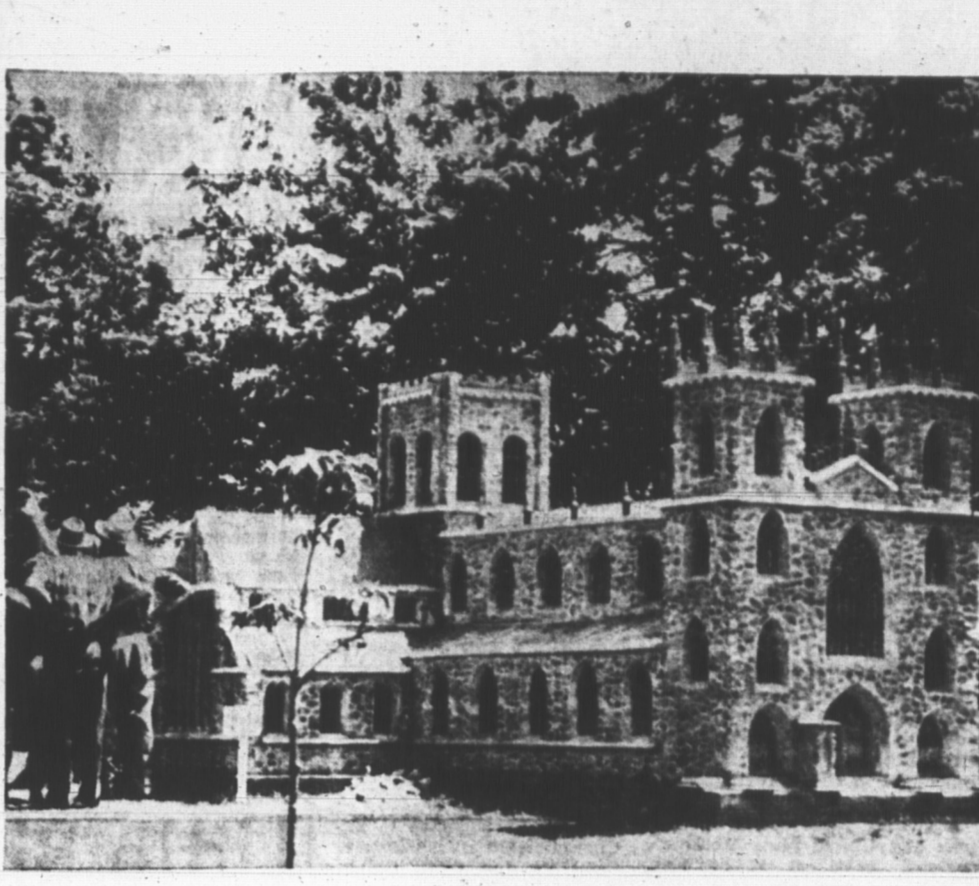
