Mercier's Race and Religion Cry.

Mr. Mercier's friends in New England who, it was stated, came to Canada in carloads to vote, were impelled thereto by the following rather frantic appeal: "To the electors of the United States who have the right to vote in the Province of Quebec: Gentlemen.—The New England committee earnestly requests you to go to Canada on the 8th of March. The reason that has led us to form this committee is that we are now witnessing in our dear province of Quebec our constitution being violated, and tyrants and despots governing us and conducting our well beloved province to ruin and to eradication of all that is Canadian and Catholic. It is for this reason that we ask you to make a supreme effort to assist in avenging an outraged constitution, and to replace in the hands of Hon. Honore Mercier the power which was snatched from him on 13th December last in violation of the constitution. The committee will assume a portion of the expense of the trip. "We have come," said one of the visitors, when he arrived at Montreal, "to rescue the church and our language from destruction by the spoiler, De Boucherville." The cry was too mean a one to successfully succeed in the nineteenth century.

New Brunswick Lieut-Governorship.

Somebody has suggested the name of Hon. Peter Mitchell, in connection with the Lieutenant-Governorship of New Brunswick. The Montreal Star and some other papers are decidedly in favor of Mr. Mitchell receiving the appointment; but the chances are ten to one that he will not get it. From a political point of view, and that is the way those matters are generally settled, Mr. Mitchell has very little claim to the office. Beyond the fact that he may be termed one of the "fathers of confederation" and that he is in many ways fitted to fill the position, he has no right to expect it. It is not the policy of governments to give away fat offices to those who oppose them, except, perhaps, when the recipient is one whom they desire, on account of his influence or ability, to silence. Mr. Mitchell has nothing to expect from the present administration. We do not lose sight of the fact that at one time he was a staunch supporter of that party and held a cabinet office, but of late years he seemed to take a particular delight in harrasing the government on every occasion. He is neither a conservative or a liberal and while in parliament acted the role of a "Mugwump." Then, again, he threw in his lot with Mercier, McShane and politicians of that ilk. The government has nothing to fear from Mr. Mitchell's influence. What little pull he had departed from him and he is now generally regarded as a political back number.

The Prohibition Commission.

Temperance people generally have no cause to complain of the selection made by the Dominion Government of commissioners to enquire into the question of prohibition. The Maritime members of the committee could not have been better selected by the temperance people themselves. Rev. Dr. McLeod, of New Brunswick, is perhaps one of the most enthusiastic prohibitionist in Canada, and is a clergyman of high standing. Of Mr. P. Monaghan, of Halifax, we need say

very little. Every Son of Temperance knows him, respects him and honors him. His appointment cannot but give universal satisfaction in Nova Scotia and this Island. Judge McDonald has had great experience as a barrister and legislator. Sir Joseph Hickson is a man of great ability and integrity. Ex-Mayor Clarke, of Toronto, is one of the brightest and most level-headed men in Ontario. Mr. Gignault, of Quebec, is said to be a staunch temperance man and in favor of prohibition. So far as the appointment of the commission goes the Government have acted square with the temperance people.

RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCE.

Church of England.

The late Andrew H. Miller, of Philadelphia, in his will bequeathed \$20,000 to the Episcopal hospital to maintain four free beds in the names of his four children, they to have the right to each keep one patient under treatment so long as they shall live. He gave \$3,000 to the Divinity school for the support of the Andrew H. Miller scholarship. LENT.—The Lenten season may be made most helpful if kept in the proper spirit. It is a time for special self-examination, and repentance. To the Christian there is a sense in which all life is a Lent. Yet there is need in a busy world for devoting special times and seasons, and even as the merchant takes stock of his business, so the Christian should examine in the light of God his spiritual life, and bring it to the test: Am I growing more and more like Christ, or am I falling away from that perfect type of a holy life.—Evangelist Churobman.

The Church of England is beginning mission work in Mashonaland, South Africa, in good earnest. Dr. Knight Bruce has been called to the bishopric of that country, and has gone there accompanied by one clergyman. Previously six laymen had been sent, by the overland route, with supplies for the mission. Among these is a carpenter who was with Dr. Livingstone through his second African expedition. Three Christian natives from Gazaland are with this party. An American layman proposes to follow shortly paying his own expenses, while guided by the rules of the mission.

Methodist.

The aggregate endowment of all the colleges and universities under the control of the Methodist Church in the United States is \$8,000,000. This at interest would yield an income of only \$500,000, while Harvard alone has an income of more than \$1,000,000. Two hundred and thirty persons have joined the Broadway Methodist Episcopal church in Camden, N. J., as the result of the recent revival. A Deaconess Home has been opened by the Methodists of Baltimore, Md. There is also one in Washington, D.C. Mrs. William C. Allison, of Philadelphia, has given \$10,000 to the new Methodist Episcopal church in Carlisle, Pa., which is a part of Dickinson College, and has been built at a cost of \$45,000. The gift is upon a condition—which will be accepted by the Trustees—that the edifice shall be named the Allison Memorial church.

Baptist.

We notice by the Messenger and Visitor the Topic of Prayer of the Women's Baptist Missionary Union for the month of March is, "For Miss McNeill, our young lady missionary at Bobbili, that she may realize the promise contained in Josh. 1: 9; that she may be successful in acquiring the language, and be filled with power from on high for her work." Miss McNeill is a daughter of Mr. John McNeill of Long Creek, Lot 65, and sister of Dr. McNeill of Kensington. She left this Island in October last in company with Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Morse to labor in the Foreign Missionary work. The party arrived safely in India shortly before Christmas and are busily engaged in the study of the language. Letters received from Miss McNeill say that she is in good health and enjoys the climate and her work well.

Mr. Sydney Kene has donated \$150,000 to the Chicago University. Rockefeller, \$1,000,000, making in all \$2,600,000 from him. Mr. Rockefeller also gives \$25,000 to Dr. Clogg for his work in India. \$10,000 to "William Jewell" College, Kansas. "Kalamazoo" College has had another \$100,000 added to its endowment fund. In answer to the unanimous vote of the first church in Boston refusing to accept his resignation, Dr. Moxon has consented to continue as pastor. Presbyterian. According to the Hamilton Spectator, Rev. Dr. Fraser, of Knox church,

has a protegee at Nazareth to whom he is going to send a purse of money. She is a young Hebrew girl named Hannah Kawar, whom the doctor met when travelling in the Holy Land last year. She has a school for young girls, and is teaching them English and fancy work, and making converts of them incidentally. Dr. Fraser was so interested in her work that he promised to help her with money when he got home.

The following story is told of the Rev. Dr. Inglis, of Annetym, who died a few months ago. He was asked to make a speech before the General Assembly of the Free Church of Scotland, and was told to be brief. He said:

"Fathers and brethren, we are told that missionaries should content themselves with stating facts, and leave the Church to draw the inference. I wish to bring three facts to your notice. "First, I place on your table," suitable the action to the word, "the Shorter Catechism translated into the language of Annetym. "Second, I place on your table also, 'Pilgrim's Progress,' translated into the language of Annetym. Then taking into his hands a large volume, while he looked longingly on the pages that had cost him years of toil, he left it on the table and said: "Third, I place on your table the Holy Scriptures, old and New Testaments, translated into the language of Annetym, and now leave the church to draw the inference," and sat down amid a storm of applause.

Pointers for Advertisers.

What do you suppose that he did with that thirty dollars? He put it into an advertisement in The Philadelphia Ledger. He now pays a man \$12,000 a year to look after his advertising and give him a big staff of assistants to help him, and I don't know how many hundred thousand he puts out in buying space in newspapers. Some men start where Wanamaker is now. Stop advertising, and end where he was when he started. Moral.—Put the first money you make into an advertisement in THE GUARDIAN.

"I haven't time to think about advertising just now. I shall have in a month or two. No doubt you will. You won't have much business to take up your time if you postpone your advertising. Your competitors don't postpone. "I shall have to wait till I have made some money before I can risk any of it in advertising. What on earth do you suppose people advertise for? To spend money or to make it? If you don't advertise, you'll never make enough to advertise with. "I can't afford to advertise." Then you can't afford to do business. "I have found advertising doesn't pay." Then you didn't know how to advertise. It pays others.
