ANSWER: Life holds few problems more hopeless than that of a drinker who is perfectly satisfied with his condition. If a man wants to throw off the shackles of alcoholism, there are agencies to render every assistance, but the set who wallows in his degradation is beyond help.

Appeal to your husband's better nature (which asserts itself during the week); seek the assistance of an older friend, clergyman or doctor; if possible, try psychiatric aid. One of these might work a miracle in your case, but at best it is a remote possibility.

OAT CRUNCHIES

Measure into bowl 3 1/4 c. rolled oats and sprinkle with 4 1/2 teps. Magic Baking Powder, 3/4 tsp. salt, 3/4 tsp. grated nutmeg; mix thoroughly. Combine 3 well-beaten eggs, 2 teps. grated orange rind, 3/4 tsp. vanilla; gradually beat in 1 1/2 c. fine granulated sugar and add 1 1/2 lbs. butter or margarine, melted. Add egg mixture to dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Drop by small spoonfuls, well apart, on greased baking sheets and centre each with a piece of nutmeat. Bake in moderate oven, 350°, about 15 mins. Remove baked cookies from pans immediately they come from the oven. Yield: 5 dozen cookies.
