Smugglers in Jail.

The Customs authorities here have unearthed a gigantic smuggling ring, employing at least three vessels.

Tommy Ryan, of Chicago, and Billy Smith, the well-known wrestler, fought each other last night for six rounds, which resulted in a draw.

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The transfer of the prisoners is due to a demand made by the military authorities, who are conducting the enquiry into the recent attempt in that city upon the life of General Martinez de Campos, on the ground that the anarchists above named were accomplices of Pallax, who was shot for throwing the bomb at General de Campos.

The anarchists were greatly alarmed when they learned that, instead of being tried by the civic courts, they would have to stand trial by a court-martial.

Hitherto they have believed that a long term of penal servitude would be the worst punishment meted out to them, but now they fear, what is extremely probable, that they will be condemned to be shot.

He received a number of applications, and last night selected Miss Mabel Pearson from the number. They were married in Christ Church.
