CBC Coronation Day Broadcasts

The CBC Coronation Day broadcast, starting at 6 a.m. Daylight Time, will feature first the Queen's drive from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey. From there on it will be the Coronation service, with the crowning of the Queen occurring at approximately 7:30 daylight time. The broadcast will include the appearance of the Queen on the balcony on her return to Buckingham Palace for the Royal Air Force fly-past. In the afternoon the Ottawa Drumhead Service will be broadcast from 2:30 to 3:30 daylight time. This will be followed by the service from Christ Church, Niagara Falls, Ont., and at 4 o'clock Commonwealth greetings will be heard from London as men and women there tell of their feelings on the big day. Three-quarters of an hour later a message from Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister, will be heard. Her Majesty will broadcast her Coronation Day message to the people at 5 o'clock daylight time; then will come a broadcast from all parts of the Commonwealth, followed by a delayed broadcast of the National Coronation ceremony at Ottawa.

The Queen's speech will be broadcast at 7 o'clock, followed by accounts of the day's events from CBC observers in London. Hon. Vincent Massey, Canada's Governor General, will be heard in a speech at 7:45 and at 8 o'clock there will be a program of Canadian Coronation music conducted by Geoffrey Waddington from the CBC Toronto studios. From 9 to 9:30 the program Coronation Bells, the sound of bells which rang out across Canada at the moment Her Majesty was crowned, will be heard and from 9:30 to 11 a repeat broadcast of the highlights of the Coronation will be given. From then till midnight there will be a Coronation concert from Montreal and from midnight till 1 o'clock a special Coronation Concert from Winnipeg.
