THE GILCHRIST SCHOLARSHIP.—Dr. Jack, President of the New Brunswick University, has received from Dr. Wm. B. Carpenter, Secretary to the Gilchrist trustees, a letter to the effect that in consequence of the urgent representations of the faculty of the N. B. University and that of Dalhousie College, the trustees have agreed to continue the scholarship for the Maritime Provinces, though only once in every three years.

HENRY SUMMERS and May Whitney, two young people who have been keeping company, were found lying on the sidewalk at Austin, Ill., on the 8th inst., with bullet holes in their heads. The girl has remained unconscious since found. Summers says the girl shot him and then herself. The pistol with which the shooting was done was Summers', and there are suspicions that he committed the deed, which is supposed to have been the result of a lover's quarrel.

A CONVERT.—Says the St. John Globe:—It is recently stated that Miss Hazen, now resident in England, has united with the Roman Catholic denomination. Miss Hazen has, for some years, devoted herself to pious and charitable work. She founded and liberally endowed the Mission Church of St. John Baptist, with whose assistance the Diocesan Synod has endeavored in various ways to wrestle. Miss Hazen is a daughter of the late R. F. Hazen, Esq., of this city, and has many warm friends in this province.

CONTRARY to all expectations, David Bothwell, who disappeared from his home in Sugary Settlement, Northumberland, N. B., four weeks ago, was found alive about half a mile from his house, on the 4th inst. When discovered he was crawling through the bushes on his hands and knees, and had a half devoured rabbit and a bottle of water with him. He was quite unable to give an account of himself, and it is still a mystery how he kept himself alive in the woods all the time he has been missing.

THE five mile scull race on Lake Sebago, on the 7th inst., near Portland, Me., between Teemer and Conley for \$1,000 a side won by the former, in thirty-four minutes, ten seconds. Teemer secured the lead in the first quarter of a mile, which he maintained to the finish, being at one time six lengths ahead of Conley. Conley spurred well on the last quarter and came in a little over a length, or two and a half seconds behind Teemer. Teemer was the favorite in betting by odds to one. Both men were in fine condition. Time made is fastest on record for five miles.

THE summit steamboat express of the Ulster & Delaware road had a narrow escape from disaster. After leaving Kingston, N. Y., on the night of the 7th, on rounding the curve, the engineer saw a mass of rocks partly covering the track. He applied the air brakes and pulled the reverse lever over and opened the throttle valve, stopping the train in less than its length, but not before the rocks had stripped off all the steps from the left side of the train and broken every cast iron journal box away from every truck from the engine to the rear of the train. The trucks, however, were not dislodged. There were several hundred business men on the train. A vote of thanks was given to the engineer.

LIEUT. GORDON, deputy superintendent of the Canadian meteorological service, has left Ottawa for Halifax to make the final preparations for embarking with a corps of observations on the Hudson Bay expedition. The expedition, with the crew and the explorers, will number fifty-five men. Professor Bell will accompany the expedition as geologist. No other scientific men will be on board excepting such as are required for the observing stations. Six stations in the Straits are to be established, which will be supplied with provisions to last until a year at least from next autumn, when, should further observations be considered unnecessary, the observers will return home.

Madame Auguste Robert, of Montreal, whose recent success in Paris as a singer has electrified Parisian society, will return home at the end of the present month in company with the distinguished tutor, Madame la Baronne de Carvia. During her brief training she has so cultivated her voice as to already enjoy a great reputation. Many of her enthusiastic friends are so delighted at her success that they urge her to follow in the footsteps of Albani, assuring her a brilliant career. She, however, is loth to take their advice, and will probably remain in Montreal. Paris-Canada, the organ of the Canadians in Paris, speaks of her recent performances in the French capital in the most eulogistic terms. Her voice is described as sweet and powerful. On the occasion of her debut, her voice filled the Albert-le-Grand hall. Madame Robert is a daughter of J. B. Labelle, merchant of St. Catherine street. At an early age she gave evidence of possessing a voice, which art has improved in no small degree. She is the wife of Auguste Robert, real estate agent of this city.—Montreal Star.
