The Northwest for Emigrants.

With regard to the climate of the Edmonton district, those already settled there speak with more than ordinary satisfaction.

The following letter, written by a Prince Edward Islander to the C. P. R. Land Commissioner, will help the reader to form some further idea of the Edmonton district.

STURGEON, N. W. Territory, Dec. 14th, 1891.

DEAR SIR,—I came from P. E. I. in 1883, and settled on section 32, R. 24, T. 54.

I have 70 acres cultivated, comparatively well stocked, and fair buildings approximate to fuel, water and timber; as these essential requirements are abundant all over Northern Alberta, no settler can make a mistake in selecting land.

I am aware that there has been a prevailing opinion throughout the Maritime Provinces that this part of the country was too far north; consequently the desire for emigrating was invariably to the south, or rather more to a country as warm or warmer than the provinces, which no doubt was very good reasoning, as the climate is the first and most important feature to be considered by any intending settler.

To remove that impression regarding the climate here, I can speak from knowledge of over eight years' experience that the climate surpasses that of the Maritime Provinces in serenity and buoyancy, caused by the air being so much drier.

Although the thermometer falls lower occasionally here, the cold is not so piercing as the cold, raw winds, with frowning skies, which prevail in the eastern provinces. It may suffice to say that horses winter out on the prairie, and cattle do well in sheds; whereas it is a well-known fact that animals would certainly die outside in winter in the east.

The next important matter that is to be considered is the soil, which I must say is second to none in the Dominion, as the manure is considered a nuisance here, as it is looked upon at home as an all important factor to replenish the soil.

In the next place, instead of pursuing the steps of our fathers' and forefathers' vicissitudes and hardships in chopping the forest off the face, all that is necessary here is to start the plow on an already made farm by nature, and the quality and quantity of grain far exceeds the most carefully fertilized and tilled soil east; and to give here the accurate yield per acre in many cases would be considered incredible.

Horses, cows and sheep do well here and profitable to the owner, as can be easily comprehended on account of such abundance of pasturage. The growth of vegetation is enormous. I have known where cattle have grazed all summer and the required hay for winter use has been cut on some ground.

Regarding risks in raising crops, I may say during my experience of over eight years, that a good average could have been raised every year. No doubt it is necessary to have the ground ready in fall to put in the wheat early, or as soon as the snow is off the ground, which takes place about 1st April. Sowing for sleighing may be looked for about 1st January.

THE LEGISLATURE

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DEBATES.

Mr. KICKHAM—I think the municipality of Charlottetown has the power to pass a law regulating the sale of cigars and cigarettes in the city, and I do not see that this Act would be any use in the country, as those articles are very little used outside of the towns.

Mr. DODD—I do not see why we should throw the Bill out. Hon. Mr. ROGERS.—Several of your honors do not see any need for this Bill in the country districts, but this petition is from the country, and the petitioners say from their own experience and from the testimony of others, they believe the evil can be lessened by what they ask for.

Mr. DODD.—Liquor is now sold freely in Charlottetown and temperance people seem to think there are not so many persons getting drunk as formerly. I do not believe this. I think it would be better to have a license law. As regards the use of cigars and cigarettes, I think the matter is not of sufficient importance to pass a law on the subject.

Mr. HOOPER—I am sure the people would consider it a great hardship if they were prevented from sending their children to buy tobacco.

Hon. Mr. ROGERS.—I do not think that objection would have much force. All a man would have to do would be to write an order, and that would save the merchant from a charge of violating the law.

The question was put on the motion that the President take the chair.

EVENING SESSION. Act to Incorporate the O'Leary Hall Company.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Laird the Bill to be intitled "An Act to Incorporate the O'Leary Hall Company" was read a second time.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—I must congratulate the people of this country on having so many public halls. In view of the formation of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association those halls will be a necessity, and then there will be the luxury of discussing politics in them also.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—I am glad to see the Leader of the Government favor the erection of public halls, and after the legislation we have had this session I think there will be great need of them for public discussion, as not only the people but the politicians need to be enlightened. I trust the next generation will be more enlightened, so that we will have men of broader views in the Legislature, and not have to listen to such absurd speeches as we have heard in this House during the last week.

The Bill was passed in Committee, and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

Summerside Incorporation Act. On motion of Hon. Mr. Laird, the Bill to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act was read a second time.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—The amendment to this Act consists of granting to the female portion of the oom unity who own property, the right to vote for Chairman and Town Councillors. The ladies of Summerside have had a considerable influence in temperance matters. It is said the present Councillors

are not in favor of temperance, and those ladies ask for the privilege of using their influence to elect temperance men.
