# Khrushchev's Son-In-Law Denies Red Spacemen Lost

MOSCOW (Reuters)—Premier Khrushchev's son-in-law has published an elaborate point-by-point denial of a New York newspaper report saying several Russian spacemen died in abortive space attempts since 1959.

Alexei Adzhubel, editor-in-chief of the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia, wrote Monday in an open letter to "Mr. Hearst", owner of the New York Journal-American, saying the newspaper was wasting "thousands of tons of paper trying to prove that Russian... cannot, if you please, outdistance the United States in such a grandiose undertaking as competition in space."

The Russian letter said the Journal-American reported the death in space of Poytr Dolgov, Oct. 11, 1960.

It continued: "Mr. Hearst, tell your collaborators that instead of listening to non-existent signals they should... go through the cuttings of existing newspapers and periodicals... to establish that... Dolgov really lost his life not in 1960..."

It was "on Nov. 1, 1962, when he was carried out a parachute descent from the stratosphere which was unprecedented in history."

The letter said five other "cosmonauts" who The Journal-American claimed lost their lives are in fact technicians. "Not one of them took part in a space flight and they are all safe and sound."

Two photographs of two of the men mentioned were carried in the same issue of Izvestia as the letter and Adzhubel promised "Mr. Hearst" would hear from them "as soon as they have read your inventions about their persons in the newspapers."

Adzhubel then quoted British astronomer Sir Bernard Lovell writing in the London Daily Mail that The Journal-American story "is pure nonsense. The people writing it approached us on two occasions and twice received denials."

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# Precedent Suggests Next One An Italian

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Precedent suggests that the next Italian prelate will become supreme ruler of the Roman Catholic Church on the death of Pope John.

Only natives of Italy have occupied St. Peter's throne since Dutch - born Adrian VI died Sept. 14, 1523, after a 20-month reign.

Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini, 65-year-old Archbishop of Genoa, is most frequently mentioned among possible successors.

Other non-Italians whose names are mentioned in speculation stirred by the grave illness of Pope John. Cardinal Montini was a close collaborator of Pope Pius XII.

Alfonso Cardinal Castaldi, 70, Archbishop of Napoli, is one of those considered a possibility in the succession. Also spoken of are these Italian cardinals on the Vatican Curia, a sacred inner court: Carlo Confalonieri, 82, Fernando Cotto, 79, Paolo Marcell, 68, Idebrando Antonini, 64, and Luigi Traglia, 68.
