Militia Group Parade Scheduled For Sunday

The annual Garrison Church Parade for all units of 2 Militia Group, and Birchwood and Queen Charlotte high school cadet corps, will be held Sunday morning, May 13, at Charlotte, Richmond and continue to the Basilica.

Following church services, the parties will move independently to Hillsboro Square, where the parade will return and move off on Richmond Street to the following order: 2 Militia Group, P.E.I.R. band, P.E.I.R. BHS band, BHS cadets, QCBS band, 3 Signal Reg., QCBS cadets, 3 Medical Coy., 3 Provost Detachment.

The parade will move west on Richmond, to Queen, to Kent to the armories. The salute will be taken in front of the provincial building on Richmond Street by the Lieutenant-Governor of the province, Major, the Honorable F. Walter Hyndman, ED, accompanied by the Garrison Commander, Col. K.M. Johnston ED.

Vocational School Site Is Announced

Hon. George Dewar, MD, minister of education, announced yesterday that the proposed vocational high school to serve Queens County will be erected on a 56-acre site of the north-east outskirts of Charlottetown.

Ship's Company Urged To Use Opportunities

Addressing the ship's company during his inspection of HMCS Queen Charlotte last evening, Commodore Paul H. Taylor, DSC, RCN, Flag Officer Naval Divisions, with headquarters in Hamilton, Ont., said the navy would like to see more young men and women take full advantage in the opportunities available to them in a career with the naval reserve and the knowledge which it brings them.

He reminded the assembled crew that during his visit to the local division last September he had suggested that each member of the ship's company should try to encourage at least one of their friends to enroll in the reserve.

"So far," he said, "the results have not come up to the standards that were then expected," and urged that all hands redouble their efforts. The commodore pointed out that it was plain to everyone that in Queen Charlotte, the city of Charlottetown had a magnificent ship and that the establishment of a reserve training school was being continuously improved in order to provide the best of training and equipment.

The inspecting officer expressed pleasure at the number of relatives and friends who were on hand to view the inspection, and for the interest they showed in not raising any objections to their husbands, sons and daughters in attending the weekly drills and the summer training periods, at the Great Lakes and on the coast.

Queens PC Candidate Lashes At Detractors Of Causeway

Progressive Conservative candidate for Queens, Heath MacQuarrie has proven to be a quarre some of the public portion of his campaign last night at a well attended meeting in Vernon River Hall. Mr. MacQuarrie dealt with transportation and said "In my campaign of 1957 I always referred to it as one of the major political and economic matters affecting our province. It has also formed the theme of many of my speeches on the floor of the House of Commons."

Another point in Island transportation brought up by the candidate was the fact that the provincial opposition leader had as premier of the province, requested the federal government to purchase the second hand "Vacationland" as an extra ferry at Beudens, instead of the "Defender" government had gone ahead and built the \$3,000,000 "Confederation," so that now the regular number of crossings during the peak season is 34 compared to 29 before the "Confederation" came on the job. "In fact," said Mr. MacQuarrie, "your four MPs are pleased since 1957, more people, more trucks, more cars, more freight than ever before has been carried across the Strait by more ships provided by the government of Canada."

Mr. MacQuarrie, in dealing briefly with the Wood Islands-Carleton sector, emphasized that under the shipbuilding subsidy act the federal government would pay 40 per cent of the new ferry for this run, adding that he would like to see this service improved and extended—possibly with more trips and later crossings.

Another point stressed by Mr. MacQuarrie was the new transport project under construction in Charlottetown at a cost of \$1,300,000 as well as the extension of the Charlottetown runway which had been sought for so many years under the former Liberal government.

"But," said Mr. MacQuarrie, "the transportation story is still being told. It is a story of "Roads to Resources," which has brought to this Island the service improved and extended—possibly with more trips and later crossings.
