SUDDEN DEATH.—At Granville, New London, on the night of Wednesday last, during the prevalence of the storm, a young man named McMillan, who had been unwell for some time, rose and went to the door. A few moments after his father found him lying dead with blood in his mouth.

The steamer Coban, Capt. Fraser, called at this port at five o'clock last evening on her return to Montreal. She remained about three hours during which time the passengers "did" the city as well as they could, and were well pleased with the results. The floral arrangements on Queen Square were the subject of much favorable comment.

T. H. CAMP, pastor of the Coburg St. Church, St. John, N. B., and one of the editors of The Christian, will preach in the Christian Church, Upper Great George St., at 6.30 to-morrow evening, and at Cross Roads, Lot 48, at 11 o'clock, a. m., Elder Ira C. Mitchell having gone to St. John to-day, where he will remain and preach over two Lord's days.

A NUMBER of men were out yesterday grappling for the body of John Gahan, the missing victim of the squall of Thursday afternoon. In the afternoon about four o'clock they succeeded in catching on to the Syndicate, which had sunk close to the middle ground off Rose Bank. When the grappling hooks were taken up a piece of coat-lining was found adhering, which it is supposed belongs to the coat worn by Gahan, but no trace of the body could be found.

ANOTHER life saved. About two years ago a prominent citizen of Chicago was told by his physicians that he must die. They said that his system was so debilitated that there was nothing left to build on. He made up his mind to try a new departure. BRITISH AFFAIRS.

Parliament Likely to Prorogue!

LONDON, Aug. 14.
The Cabinet has decided to appoint a Royal Commission to enquire into the cause of the Belfast riots.
The Queen's speech has been approved of by Salisbury, who will go to Osborne on Sunday to submit to Her Majesty the fact that a majority of the Cabinet were in favor of proroguing Parliament until February next, unless events in Ireland should make an autumn session necessary. Sir Michael Hicks Beach expressed confidence in the Government's ability to preserve order in Ireland without having recourse to special legislation.

TORONTO'S SENSATION.

Damaging Evidence Forthcoming.

TORONTO, Aug. 14.
George MacInerney, yard-man for Burns, the coal-dealer, yesterday surrendered to the police and was bailed out. This completes the arrests of alleged conspirators. Beyond doubt the Crown's principal witness is Symonds, a defaulting book-keeper of Burns who is now quartered in Detroit a fugitive from Canadian justice. He will, without doubt, be brought back to give evidence in this case as the Attorney-General has consented to guarantee that Symonds will not be prosecuted for embezzlement from Burns, if he should come to testify. Symonds' accusation, which had been put in writing, is very sweeping and implicates—but not criminally—many others besides those now under arrest.

FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT!

Halifax Quietening Down.

HALIFAX, Aug. 14.
The prizes won at the Firemen's Tournament were presented to the several winners yesterday by Captain Roger O'Brien, of the Union Engine Company. The city seems very quiet now after its recent excitement, mostly all the visitors having left for home. The Chelsea, Mass., men go on the steamer which leaves this afternoon. A grand military tournament began yesterday and will be concluded to-day. The programme includes sword, bayonet and lance exercises, feats of horsemanship, foot races, etc.

Fatal Yachting Accident.

SUMMERSIDE, Aug. 14.
Late yesterday evening Mr. Howard Farrow, Mr. Robblee, Mr. Crawford Brown and Mr. Henry Wright were coming from Egmont Bay to Summerside in a yacht, the yacht grounded on Misconche shoals. Mr. Farrow was struck by a slinging boom, knocked overboard and drowned.
Mr. Farrow's sad and untimely end is very deeply felt by the whole community. He was an active merchant and trader—a son of Mr. Edward Farrow, of Bedoue and about thirty years of age. His widow is a daughter of Mr. Brown, of St. Eleanor's but he leaves no children.

Run Down in a Fog.

PARRSBORO, N. S., Aug. 14.
The barque Midas, of Maitland, N. S., which arrived here yesterday, had on board the crew of the Yarmouth fisherman, Sisters, which the Midas ran down off Seal Island during a heavy fog.

A Peaceful City.

BELFAST, Aug. 14.
This city is now fairly quiet. There is still some stone throwing, but little or no damage is done.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon a young lad named Hatch, charged with being a vagrant and having a number of keys in his possession, with which, it is suspected, he was in the habit of entering stores during the night, was sentenced to six months imprisonment. A young woman named Connick was arraigned for street walking and being out after hours. Staff-Capt. Herbert, of the Gospel Army, who was present, stated that some time ago she had taken the prisoner in hand and had endeavored to reform her, but her efforts were unsuccessful. She asked His Honor to send her to prison until such time as she could communicate with the authorities of the Home at Portland, Me., where, she thought, the unfortunate girl would be received and tenderly cared for. His Honor then addressed the prisoner, chiding her for being so ungrateful to those who took such great interest in her. He accepted Staff-Capt. Herbert's proposition and would sentence her to jail for one month, but if she ever appeared before him again he would punish her as a common criminal.
