FATALITY AT PRESTON.

Two Colored Children Burned to Death.

Others Saved With Difficulty—Suffocated With Smoke.

HALIFAX, Oct. 14.—Two children lost their lives in a burning house at Preston, seven miles from here, at midnight. The house was occupied by Peter Downey, a colored man. It took fire while the family were asleep. Mrs. Downey was ill and it was with difficulty she and her children were removed. There were two others in the house at the time, nephews of Downey, Arthur and Harry Wild, eight and ten years of age. They were removed last of all but when taken out were found suffocated by smoke and nothing could be done to restore them.

Hon. Mr. Blair Banquetted.

St. JOHN, Oct. 14.—The banquet to Hon. Mr. Blair passed off well. The Minister, in his speech which closed about two o'clock, said he proposed to enter into competition with the C. P. R., to bring freight to St. John claiming that the Intercolonial could bring it as quickly and as cheap as the shorter route which had a heavier grade. It would require five, six or seven hundred thousand dollars to put St. John in shape to handle traffic on the east side, and he proposed to ask his colleagues to spend that much.

The Cattle Were Slaughtered.

St. JOHN, Oct. 14.—The Jersey cattle bought by the Government for stock purposes from J. B. Reburn, of the Eastern Townships, were slaughtered today, the Government, after a long controversy, agreeing to pay Reburn one hundred dollars and all his expenses. The animals were killed in the presence of government officials, but the results of the post mortem are not yet announced.

Rumored New Partnership.

HALIFAX, Oct. 14.—It is rumored that Hon. F. Peters is to resign the Premiership of P. E. Island to form a partnership with Sir C. H. Tupper to carry on a law practice in Victoria, B. C. This rumor is believed to be well founded. Sir Hibbert will likely retain his seat in Pictou.

A Cape Breton Suicide.

WEST BAY, C. B., Oct. 14.—The suicide took place at his home last week of Donald Nickillop, an aged farmer who was widely known and respected by all. He cut his throat almost from ear to ear. No reason can be assigned for the rash deed.

Hanged Himself at Home.

ALMA, Ont., Oct.—Jacob Grosse a farmer went to a funeral with his wife yesterday. On the way home the couple quarrelled over trivial matters. Grosse told his wife they would not be together much longer and on his arrival home hanged himself.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—A tornado struck New Jersey today. It travelled from the little village of Far Hills, near Summit, to Elizabeth. At Elizabeth it wrecked a building and killed a man who had sought shelter there.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 12.—Attorney-General Fitzgerald, of California, in the supreme court today, moved to advance the hearing of the case of W. T. Durand, under sentence of death in California. The court took the matter under advisement.

PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 12.—One of the wildest gales that has swept along the coast for months prevailed in this vicinity this afternoon. Reports from incoming vessels were to the effect that a terrible sea was running outside and if any vessels were obliged to remain outside all night in the storm their chance of reaching port in safety was not very bright. No disasters have been reported.

MANDALAY, Burma, October 12.—A gang of 250 Burmese, armed with long knives, rushed through the south gate of Mandalay last night and made for the residence of Major Dobbie, but they were driven off by the British officers and Sepoys on guard. Four of the Burmese were killed and four wounded. Lieutenant Harrington, of the British force, and three other Sepoys were wounded.

SIMLA, October 12.—A despatch from Mahmood announces that the Jirga tribesmen have surrendered their rifles, and have solemnly sworn to maintain the peace and drive out Umr Khan's followers. The troops forming the Mahmood punitive expedition have destroyed twenty-six fortified villages, and have killed many of the insurgent natives.

MADRID, Oct. 12.—A private cable message from Washington declares that president McKinley will endeavour to induce the insurgents to accept autonomy and if they refuse he will do his utmost to put an end to the agitation and prevent filibustering, as he believes that now that Weyler is recalled congress will support that policy.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 12.—Four men held up a train 12 miles from here this afternoon and secured about two hundred dollars from the passengers. An attempt to get the safe open was unsuccessful.

OTAWA, Oct. 12.—A militia general order issued today provides that all appointments for commanding officers are for five years. Any extension of tenure will be for three years only. The orders also contain a despatch from Hon. Joseph Chamberlain saying that jubilee medals should be worn with uniform after all English decorations and before all other medals. The appointment of honorary lieutenant colonels to each regiment of cavalry, brigade of field artillery, regiment of garrison artillery and battalion of infantry will be approved on the condition that a sanction is obtained from headquarters, that will not confer the right to command and that no public expense be incurred in reference to royal schools of inspection. The general officer commanding says that the class of non-commissioned officers and men sent for instruction are not always creditable to the corps to which they belong and that better care should be exercised in their selection.

CARMICHAEL SURRENDERS.

It will be remembered that three men convicted in the McGuinness assault case were sentenced last week, one of them being a St. John man. The fourth prisoner, James Carmichael, alias "Baldy" Carroll, forfeited his bail. He returned to Boston on Saturday morning, gave himself up to the police, and, within an hour, was sentenced to state prison for a term of not more than 15 years and not less than 12 years. Carmichael told the officers that he returned to Boston from New York. His wife and a friend named W. S. Barker were on his \$3,000 bond. He says he left Boston last Friday night, driving a team as far as Hartford, Conn. There he took a boat to New York, and it was his intention to sail to London, where he intended to be one of "Young" Sullivan's seconds in the latter's coming fight with Plimmer. Carmichael had shaved off his mustache and was growing a chin whisker. His disguise was developing in good shape when he turned up. He seemed to take his sentence very coolly.

"MARINER" ANSWERED.

SIR,—In looking over the last EXAMINER I see a tirade on the Grand River buoy service over the signature of "Mariner." The very fact that one who pretends to have the interest of the place at heart does not give what he pretends to be facts over his own name is sufficient proof that they are false. He charges me with the same crime that Sir Robert Walpole charged William Pitt with, that of being young. In his crusty brain he seems to think that a young man should not be allowed to earn his living. But I can inform him that the people of Annandale have before now given me positions of (not with his consent) trust both in church and state. Besides all this I have for one of my sureties a man who has been surety for the three previous buoy masters and another of my sureties is the oldest pilot on the River, a man who piloted ships and vessels in this river before "Mariner" opened his eyes to behold the blue skys of the Maritime Provinces. I would also inform him that it was this man who buoyed and staked the river this year according to the instructions of the harbor master, and if "Mariner" has any ships he is uneasy about, wind and tide permitting, he will pilot them to their destination free of charge. Now as to the buoys used. The bar buoy and inside buoys were made according to plans furnished to Mr. John Swallow. The present bar buoy has served that purpose for seven years, the other buoys for shorter periods of time. But they are all the same as those used by previous contractors. Now, "Mariner" I can bring the testimony of the Captain of the only vessel at present sailing out of this harbor that the river is buoyed and staked better than it has been for years. I can bring the testimony of the best pilot out of Georgetown to the same effect. And it seems evident that you must have had some of the contents of an ale cask in you when you counted the stakes as there were never less than thirty and at present forty in the places you spoke of. Now "Mariner" will you, over your own name, name a point or shoal where the two previous contractors had stakes that there are none now, and also the places where they are now that had none before. You need not bother about the harbor master. He do a good deal more towards looking after the harbor than any of his predecessors within the memory of the present generation. More anon if necessary.
