FISHING NOTES. SOUTHERN, Sept. 4.—A good catch of mackerel four miles south east of East Point to-day. The Minnie Mand got 25 blbs; Ethel B Jacobs 65 blbs; S F Maker 60 blbs; John McKenzie 45 blbs; Parkhurst 70 blbs. Some time was spent on the fishing grounds but we have not heard how many she got, also the Geo W Pierce and several Lunenburg vessels. Cruiser Kingfisher had a half bucket of bait on board and with it caught several mackerel.

Three of our principal mackerel dealers left last night by the St. Olaf for the Magdalen Islands, Mr. C. S. H. Sterns, Jas. E. Grant and Archibald Currie. As the people of the Magdalen Islands may not be posted on the sudden advance in the price of mackerel, there is no doubt they will make their trip a profitable one.

Ethel B Jacobs has on board 335 blbs mackerel. She will leave the Bay about the 10th. The captain hopes to fill up the balance of his barrels before that date.

Capt. Jacobs is commorale of the American fishing fleet in North Bay. As he said to Capt. Kent of the cruiser Kingfisher: "When one of our vessels speak a vessel on the fishing grounds, they never ask if there is any mackerel, but 'Do you know where Jacobs is?' When the answer is in the affirmative the word is 'Haul at the main sheet and hoist the balloon jib, we must find Saul!'"

The London Times, referring to Canada's resolution of the colonial conference at Ottawa, calling for tenders for a Pacific cable, says: "With Alexander Siemens' estimate that such a cable could be laid immediately for two million pounds, leaving a working capital of fifty thousand pounds, and be finished in three years, in two for an extra thirty thousand pounds, the question is entering the stage in which the Governments concerned have to decide what part they mean to take. The question, moreover, is not purely a financial one. The main consideration is public utility. The nation which lays the first cable, establishes the first steamship line may expect to hold a commanding position in the Pacific, and in the efforts the British colonies are making to secure this position for Great Britain, they are simply obeying the dictates of self-interest." The Times concludes by urging the laying of the cable, as it says: "The construction would not commit the Government to the purchase of the whole existing system. On the contrary, if it were deemed desirable, there should be little difficulty in disposing of the line to a private company unless the estimates of the experts are widely mistaken."
