French Railway Horror.

Passengers Roasted and Drowned.

Terrible Scenes.

OTTAWA, July 28. The latest reports from the French Railway collision, at St. Maude, near Vincennes, contain heartrending accounts of the agonies of the sufferers. The cars took fire and the people were slowly roasted to death. Others were drowned by torrents of water poured on by firemen. A majority of the victims were women and children. The disaster was caused by some unknown miscreant deliberately altering the signals so as to bring the trains into collision. Forty-nine persons are killed and near a hundred wounded.
