WESTWARD HO!

Over Prairie and Mountain.

Springtide on the Pacific Coast.

[STAFF CORRESPONDENCE.]

It was well into the night when our

belated train pulled up at Winnipeg. A

stay of only an hour or two was made.

Next morning we were away out on the

prairie, "a weary wad expanding to the

skies," patched with snow or gray with

hoar frost. Little towns spread out so

strangely on the level prairie, are passed

at intervals. At the station a mounted

police man or two in uncomforably tight

looking red jackets and bushy hats, stalk

up and down, while the ignoble red man

bees ponies at the car windows. Fine

looking men are these mounted police-

men, and about one thousand of them are

scattered over the country.

Another day and Brandon is reached.

The country has been gradually rising and

is now at an altitude of 1,150 feet. Here

our watches are set back an hour, which

makes two hours gained since leaving

Montreal. The first set back was at

Port Arthur. We are now travelling on

"mountain time."

On and on the train keeps rushing.

The Bell Farm is passed a little beyond

Sintaluta, where the furrows are four

miles long, and there is "ploughing by

brigades and resping by divisions." From

Regina to the Cypress Hills the prairie

was somewhat disappointed. It has

many buildings, however, that would do

credit to a city of a century's growth, and

indeed the city is a marvel when it is

remembered that it is only six years old

and yet has a population almost equal to

that of Victoria. Its situation is good as

regards picturesque, natural drainage,

harbor facilities and commercial advan-

tage. Regular steamship services have

been established between it and Japan,

China, Victoria, San Francisco, Alaska

and Puget Sound ports. There is some

farming land to the South, and at Nanaimo

are extensive coal mines. Vancouver bids

fair to become a very important city. A

noticeable feature is the number of young

men occupying good positions, and who,

growing up with the town, will be sure to

succeed and control its destiny. Among

these are Mr. Robert Palmer, C. E., son

of Chas. Palmer Esq., Mr. Geo. Scott,

son of Robert Scott Esq., carriage

builder, Mr. Albert McNeill, L.L.B. son

of Rev. D. McNeill and several other in-

landers. All are working up good busi-

nesses. Mr. Scott is Inspector of agencies

for a leading insurance company, and as a

Real Estate agent he is known far and

near. It appears difficult for young men

coming here to obtain positions, but when

they do get fixed it is their own fault if

they fail.

Victoria is a delightful old city, solid

and substantial and "quite English, you

know." Here we met Henry Lawson,

Esq., the genial editor of the Colonist.

Mr. Lawson speaks in the highest terms

of the land and people among whom his

lot has been cast and indeed he looks as

if they have been good to him.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DEBATES.

THURSDAY, April 14th.

MORNING SESSION.

Mr. NICHOLSON asked the Leader of

the Government to lay on the table all

petitions received asking to close the

road known as the "Old Georgetown

Road" in Lot 49, copies of claims

made and by whom. Also copies of

orders in Council, if any, passed in re-

ference to same, also a statement

showing what action the Government

intend taking in the matter.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—Several of the

bridges on that road had fallen down

and it would take about \$2000 to re-

place them, and as the road was scarce-

ly used at all it was better to close it up.

The sum of \$90 was paid as compensa-

tion to those injured by the closing of the

road.

Mr. MACKENZIE presented a petition

from certain inhabitants of New Lon-

don, asking for an Act to incorporate

the New London Hall Company.

The petition was read and laid on

the table.

Murray Harbor South Temper-

ance Hall Company.

On motion of Mr. Poole the Bill to be

intituled "An Act to Incorporate

the Murray Harbor South Temperance

Hall Company" was read a second

time.

House in Committee on the said

Bill.

Mr. SCRIMGEUR in the chair.

The several clauses of the Bill were

read and agreed to.

The PRESIDENT took the chair and

the Chairman reported the Bill agreed

to without any amendments.

Ordered that the said Bill be read a

third time on Monday next.
