Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 3.

Two more fishery protection cruisers were to-day ordered on duty.

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught will arrive here at one o'clock to-morrow and will be escorted with a civic address in the Senate Chamber. He will lunch with the Premier at Earnscliffe, and after a drive around the town will leave for Montreal at four o'clock.

On the return of Mr. Wilmot, who is now gathering pointers in Newfoundland, the Minister of Fisheries will select a location in Nova Scotia for an experimental lobster hatchery.

The Newfoundland Trouble.

PARIS, June 3.

The Canadian agent here declares that the Newfoundland agitation is superficial, and that it is merely a quarrel of rival fishermen.

LONDON, June 3.

The Newfoundland delegates here declare that the French deputy Deloncle's suggestion that England concede to France fishing rights in Labrador, is the wildest nonsense. They also ridicule the idea that England will be able to compel Newfoundland to accept an objectionable settlement.

TORONTO, June 3.

A special cablegram from London to the Globe says: Excited telegrams from St. John's and Halifax, respecting the Newfoundland crisis, are doing much harm here, prejudicing the British mind against the colonists' case. According to despatches, the belief is current in the Island that the delegates here have met a cool reception, nothing could be further from the truth. The delegates have every reason to be satisfied with the results of their labors so far. The papers during the past few days have been discussing the question fully and in more favorable tones. Even the Times, which originally ridiculed the idea of buying out French rights, now admits that it is worth while to make an effort gradually. A truer notion of the real facts of the case is being grasped by the press and public men.

A Prosperous Year.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., June 3.

This has been a very prosperous year for Acadia college and the Institutes generally. The number of registered students was 134 and of this number 19 graduate. The Senate has been in session all day. It will recommend the granting of some honorary degrees, and two or three graduates will receive the degree of M. A. The senate has under consideration the question of the relation of the Senate to the Government and also that of increasing the efficiency of the staff. The closing ceremonies of Horton take place to-morrow afternoon, and of Acadia Seminary in the evening. The college exercises are set for Thursday morning and in the evening a repetition will be given to the alumni by the graduate classes.

The Basis of Enquiry.

TORONTO, June 3.

A special despatch to the Mail from Washington says that three Canadian railways to which the United States have granted bonding privileges are charged with violating treasury regulations, and that this is at the basis of the enquiry which is proposed by Senator Cullon as to the operation of the bonding system and as to the expediency of continuing that system.

Decorated the Monument.

TORONTO, June 3.

Yesterday being the twenty fourth anniversary of the battle against the Fenians at Ridgeway, a number of survivors of the engagement, headed by Col. Gilmore, assembled and marched to Queen's Park and decorated with flowers the monument erected there to the memory of their fallen comrades.

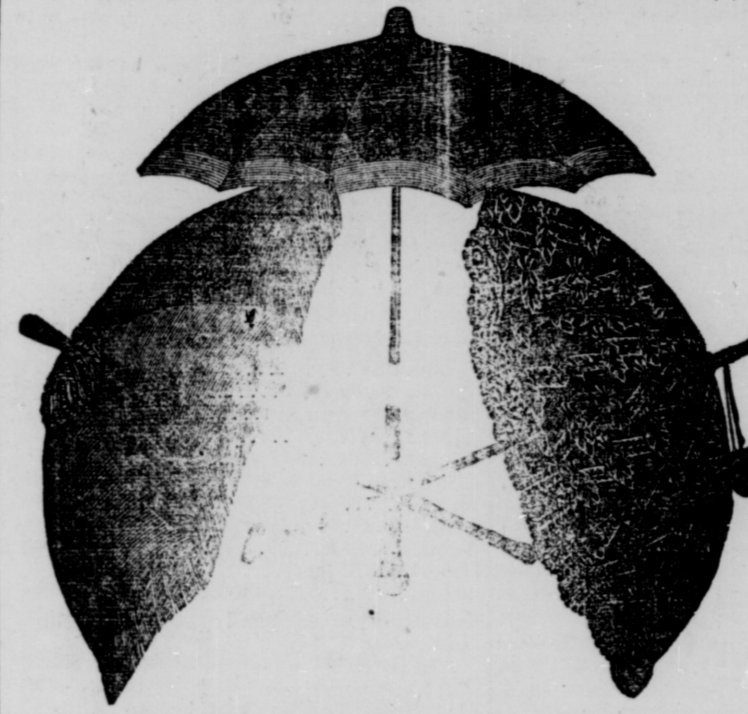
