Important News For Oldtimers

We have heard a lot of talk in recent years about the apparently irresponsible younger generation that is coming up and we were reading an interesting article in a widely read magazine and we thought part of it would be worth passing on to some of our older readers. (Maybe they will be no more but we'll take a chance.)

In a one high-school graduation class in the States there were four national swimming champions, two of whom had broken world records. Athletes don't usually reach their peak until they are in their twenties, but these teenagers have already performed amazing feats of speed, stamina, strength and co-ordination that call for world recognition.

As athletes, today's younger generation is the most phenomenal in history. In 1959 Gertrude Ederie swam the English Channel and this was believed to be a fantastic feat and she was honored with a ticker-tape parade in New York. But today, girls in the 13- and 14-year-old group have to come up to Miss Ederie's record for the 100 metres merely to win the right to compete in small neighborhood meets under official U.S. Amateur Athletic Union auspices.

It's the same story on dry land. Not one Olympic track and field champion before 1932 could qualify on the basis of his winning performance for a place in this year's games. The once most starting single athletic accomplishment of our times the four minute mile is within the grasp of high school boys today.

By sheer determination youngsters all over the continent by means of physical labor more gruelling than any previous generation are teaching that the word for physical strength that lies latent and mostly unused in the human body is: astounding.

This columnist is not far along in years and we have heard many stories about athletic feats before our time that left us with our mouth wide-open in amazement so we just thought we would pass this little bit of information along to some of our 'story tellers.'

By JOHN SHORT SASKATOON (CP) — Manitoba posted its seventh successive triumph in the 1965 Canadian curling championship Thursday-afternoon, a 13-7 triumph over Alberta. But the rink failed to gain ground on the tenacious Saskatchewan rink skipped by Harold Worth of Delisle.

Terry Braunstein of Winnipeg clipped out an Alberta stone on the button in the 13th end to kill the last threat of a tie by the Calgary quarter directed by Nick Lashuk of Calgary.

Meanwhile, Worth had an easy time defeating the Newfoundland rink skipped by George MacCharles of St. John's 16-8 in the eighth round of the 11-team round-robin competition.

Worth, who drew the bye in the ninth round Thursday night, boosted his record to seven wins and one loss.

Idle Quebec, skipped by Bill Tracy of Bagotville, and Northern Ontario, skipped by Jack Polyblank of Kirkland Lake, had only two defeats to show for seven games. Polyblank rapped Dr. Pete Lyons and his New Brunswick foursome from Moncton 9-4.

Habs Tie Maple Leafs; Rangers Nip Bruins 4-3

MONTREAL (CP) — Claude Provost's 25th goal of the season midway through the third period earned Montreal Canadiens a 2-2 tie with Toronto Maple Leafs Thursday night before 15,676 National Hockey League fans at the Forum.

Provost, the stocky first-half all-star right-winger and the NHL's No. 4 point-getter, was credited with the tying mark on a wild play at 12:03 of the final period.

With Toronto defenceman Kent Douglas serving a penalty and Canadiens trying to get a power play going, centre Henri Richard drove over the Leaf blue line and fired the puck behind the net.

John Ferguson took a swipe at it in an effort to centre it and the puck took off, striking Provost's arm as he cruised by the corner of the cage and dropping behind a startled Terry Sawchuk in the Toronto goal.

Centre Jean Beliveau scored Canadiens' other goal, while left-winger Frank Mahovlich, the most dangerous forward on the ice, and rightwinger Don McKenney, recalled earlier this week from the minors, counted the Toronto goals.

The tie was an important one for the Canadiens, who broke a second-place tie with Detroit and pulled to within two points of league-leading Chicago. They still have two games in hand over the Hawks.

Toronto, which has not won in five starts, remained in fourth place, five points behind the third-place Red Wings.

Playoffs in three divisions of the Charlottetown Minor Hockey League will get underway at the Forum on Friday and Saturday of this week with the Bantams commencing on Friday evening and the Pee Wee and Paperweight divisions on Saturday.
