The remains of many of the bodies are so charred and mutilated that it is impossible to tell whether they are men or women.

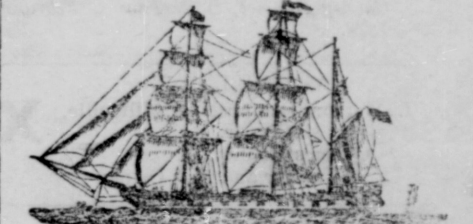
