

Unprecedented Soviet Attack Made On Mao And His Policies

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Communist party has made an unprecedented attack on Mao Tse-tung and his ideas.

The attack clearly showed the Kremlin sees virtually no chance of healing the Moscow-Peking split while Mao and his supporters rule China.

It also underscored a burgeoning Soviet offensive to have the great majority of the world's

Communist parties meet and officially isolate China by denouncing Mao's brand of Communism.

This line is expected to gain steam today with the opening of a Hungarian Communist party congress attended by Leonid I. Brezhnev, the Soviet party leader. Brezhnev is expected to push the world meeting idea just as he did at a Bulgarian party congress two weeks ago.

The Soviet attack on Mao contained veiled hints that the Soviets are prepared to support possible opposition forces in the Chinese Communist party against Mao.

This implication, plus the personal attack on Mao, made it virtually certain that the Chinese will feel compelled to reply

in terms that could only deepen the Moscow-Peking split.

The Soviet attack came in a 4,000-word article spread over the bottom of three pages in Pravda, voice of the Soviet Communist party.

Pravda described the Soviet position as one of continued restraint in the face of repeated Chinese attacks that could now go longer so unanswered.

Pravda said Mao adopted an "erroneous course" deliberately hostile to the Soviet Union, that split the world Communist movement and hampered aid efforts to North Viet Nam.

Pravda also charged that Mao ruthlessly replaced Communist ideology with his own thought, thereby raising a threat to the world Communist movement that must be overcome.

Agriculture Students Learn Marketing Side Of Farming

WINNIPEG (CP)—Some of the best teachers of agriculture students at the University of Manitoba have not been near a classroom for years.

They are business executives and government administrators involved in marketing, distribution and processing of food products. At least 50 of them are involved annually in showing students in the second-year class of the diploma course in agriculture how farm products are handled once they leave the farm.

Each of these off-campus experts and specialists lectures and demonstrates his organization's role in the marketing chain as part of an unique course in "marketing policies and practices."

Students spend two days a week for 30 weeks touring market agencies, sales firms, processing plants and retail outlets. Their task is to find out from the men in charge of the mechanics of the market and the economics involved. In some cases the students are short-term employees.

"The purpose of the course," says Prof. Gordon Anderson, "is to show the future commercial farmers just what happens to farm products before they are offered to the consumer."

"They learn where and what charges are set for the services performed all along the line and what economic factors underlie

the day-to-day business of the food industry."

STUDY GRAIN MARKETING

The course concentrates on the marketing and handling of grain and grain products, livestock and meats and produce such as vegetables.

Their study of the grain marketing structure places the students in direct contact with such grain handling firms as the federal-Searle Grain Co., Manitoba Pool Elevators, Canada Malt Co. and United Grain Growers. They discuss marketing with officials of the Canadian wheat board, the board of grain commission and the Winnipeg Grain Exchange.

The highlight of this portion of the course is a trip to the Lakehead to get a first-hand look at a grain terminal and a malting plant. Members of the grain trade finance the major portion of this trip.

In their study of the livestock and meat marketing business, the students work for two days in teams of two with member firms of the Winnipeg Livestock Exchange. They feed and water cattle consigned to the firms, group them in selling lots and scrutinize lots for purchase.

Lectures and tours of the Manitoba hog marketing commission offices, Canada Packers, Swift Canadian Co. and the Red River Co-operative Supermarket meat department are part of the course.

The bidding:

East South West North

Opening lead—two of clubs. Let's say you're declarer at six—hearts doubled and West leads a club. You play the ace, at the same time thanking your lucky stars because West led a club instead of a diamond. You know that East has the king of hearts, judging from the double, and that you would certainly have gone down with a diamond lead.

However, you're still not out of the woods with the club lead, but you know that now you at least have a shot at the contract. You cash the ace of spades and ruff a club.

'Marriage Breakdown' Urged As Legal Grounds For Divorce

OTTAWA (CP)—Two lawyers and a women's rights group have made a plea that "marriage breakdown" be allowed as legal grounds for divorce. The principal acceptable grounds now is adultery.

Toronto lawyers James C. MacDonald and Lee K. Ferrier presented a joint brief to the Senate-Commons special committee on divorce. It sought marriage breakdowns as the sole grounds for divorce.

The Canadian Committee on the Status of Women thought marriage breakdown allied with more traditional grounds such as adultery, cruelty and desertion "would more aptly reflect public opinion."

The brief of the 10-member committee—founded in 1963—said the courts could take into account the overall situation and specific matrimonial offences in deciding whether the marriage had broken down.

The lawyers argued that an offence such as adultery fails to provide either real or moral

cause for dissolving a marriage. It was the failure of the relationship between the two people that did so.

MUST PROVE BREAKDOWN

Breakdown allowing breakup was defined as the point when there was no reasonable possibility of a couple living together again. It would not be divorce by consent because applicants would have to prove breakdown.

As part of marriage breakdown, the couple would have to show proof they had lived separately for two years of the previous three.

The women's brief suggested the court should take into account how much the divorce applicant can tolerate in the partner when seeking proof of breakdown.

Divorce on these grounds would also get away from naming a guilty partner as under the existing system. In most cases both partners contributed

to the day-to-day business of the food industry.
