LONDON, April 18 — (CP) —

The Lord Chamberlain's office in St. James's Palace is bulging with so many scripts of plays from prolific authors that several thousand copies are to be moved to the British Museum for safekeeping there. The Lord Chamberlain's approval must be obtained before a play is eligible for public performance. "We are getting about 1,000 scripts a year," said an official. "We have always kept copies as a national record but some years ago all scripts up to 1850 were moved to the British Museum to make room. "Now our space is becoming limited again. We have so many scripts that the total is not known. Those submitted during the last 40 years alone total about 70,000. At one time these scripts dated back to the days of Shakespeare. Many disappeared before adequate storage provision was made. Those now in storage in the Museum date from 1824."
