### Recording Secretary

"During the year of 1950 we held ten regular meetings, one special meeting and eight executive meetings. At the end of the year our treasurer's report shows that all diocesan, national and other obligations have been attended to, also that we took in the amount of \$1,249.20 during the year, with disbursements \$962.86 leaving a balance of \$286.34 cash on hand.

### Citizenry

Convener, Mrs. Elmer Pineau — "We are represented in the following societies — Red Cross, Children's Aid, Ladies Aid of Prince County Hospital, Local Association of Girl Guides, Home and School Group, League of Mercy, St. Dunstan's Scholarship fund for girls and the Tuberculosis League.

Social Service — Convener Mrs. Jos. Linkletter. — "We continued during the year to provide milk for needy families and also helped two families to the amount of \$50.00. Our convener with her committee made thirty-nine visits and paid out \$200.70 for groceries, clothing, meat and milk. We assisted the Sisters of the convent in preparing the children for First Holy Communion and Confirmation. At Christmas time boxes were packed for the Orphanage and a donation of \$25.00 given to the Kinsmen for their Christmas donations.

We also supplied cod liver oil capsules to the Sisters and pupils at the convent. The following donations were also made: Gift to the League of Mercy tea; Tuberculosis League \$5.00; Children's Aid Society \$25.00; Our Ladies Mission \$15.00; Winning Relief Fund \$25.00; Sisters of Martha \$25.00; and a donation of \$50.00 to a member of our church who is entering the priesthood. We also, during the year, helped supply a fancy work booth at the Charlottetown exhibition for the Sisters of the Precious Blood.

Girl Guides and Youth Organizations — Convener Mrs. Wilfred Perry — "We sponsor the 2nd and 4th Companies of Girl Guides and Brownies, and contributed \$18.00 to aid these companies in their year's work. There are fifty Guides and twenty-four Brownies enrolled with two captains and four lieutenants. The Catholic companies of Guides gave a creditable showing at the badge presentation held in the church basement, also at the showing of the Guide Scroll held at the High School. We helped the Knights of Columbus by holding a cake sale at their lawn party for the boys camp, and we also sponsored the dance at the Newman Club. At the end of the school year we again sponsored a dinner and dance for the graduating class at the convent, which proved to be highly successful.

Membership — Convener — Mrs. Frank Arsenault — "We have paid up membership of 73 which includes fifteen new members taken in.

Magazines — Convener, Mrs. George Olscamp — "We have thirty-three paid up subscriptions, distributed among fifty members.

Publicity — Convener, Mrs. Josephine Murphy — "All regular meetings and other important activities of the sub-division have been reported to the local papers, particularly the Journal and Guardian. The fullest co-operation was received from these newspapers. Mrs. Murphy also suggested that future convener of publicity would report all meetings promptly when it is really news.

Education — Convener, Mrs. Leo Wood — "We contributed prizes as follows: \$35.00 to St. Mary's Convent; \$2.50 to the High School; \$10.00-Catechism; \$100.00 — Girls St. Dunstan's Scholarship Fund, and \$50.00 Musical Festival Association.

Red Cross — Convener — Mrs. D. F. MacNeill — "During the past year members of our sub-division assisted in every way with the activities of the Red Cross. Three blood donor clinics were held, and our members helped by contacting donors, and also to serve refreshments at the clinic. There was a large representation of our members at the Diocesan Council meeting held at Coyle's Restaurant last fall and two delegates attended this annual meeting at Charlottetown in February. There were twenty members collecting for the Red Cross drive. We have some very faithful members in our sub-division and the following work was finished and handed in: Baby gowns—18; girls' dresses—two; baby vests—3; pyjamas—2; baby bonnets—2; ankle socks—20 pairs and 12 sweaters.

Programmes and Entertainment — Convener — Mrs. Laurier Peters — "After most of our regular meetings, we had a social hour of cards, entertainment and refreshments. We held our annual card party and also held separate card parties at our homes realizing a good sum. The annual dance was held at the Imperial Dance Palace and realized \$88.44. Our annual collection amounted to \$187.00. During the year we held farewell parties for three of our members who were leaving to reside elsewhere. They were programs of music and song, and refreshment and each guest of honor was presented with a rosary.

### IN MEMORIAM

ROBERT C. MACNAUGHT

The funeral service for the late Mr. Robert C. MacNaught was held from his late residence at Carleton Lot 6 on Saturday afternoon April 7th and despite impassable roads, there were scores of sympathetic friends, neighbors and relatives who gathered to pay their last respects to one who was universally loved, honored and respected. The short service at his home was conducted by his Minister, Rev. Warren Dickson, of O'Leary who was assisted by Rev. John M. Sheen of Elmsdale and Rev. C. O. Howlett of O'Leary.

The main service was held in the Brae United Church and was conducted by Rev. Mr. Dickson who spoke on the theme of "Death, our great enemy shall be conquered." The Minister paid a sincere tribute to Mr. MacNaught as a kindly, amiable man; one who was well read and kept up with the times. He spoke of his thoughtfulness and consideration for others and mentioned his faith and trust in Jesus and his interest in the Church. He always took a prominent part in the work of any organization dedicated to the improvement and betterment of the community and district. The Minister stated that for such a man, death was not a conquest, but a coronation, not an ending but a new beginning, not a terminus but a thoroughfare. Rev. Mr. Sheen read the Scripture and led in prayer.

The choir with Mrs. Fred MacLeod as organist rendered the favorite hymns of the deceased, "Un-til the Hills," "Lead Kindly Light" and "Abide With Me."

He leaves to mourn his loss three sons, Rev. Roy MacNaught in San Salvador, Central America; Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, K. C., M. P., of Summerside, Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries and Federal Member for Prince County; Mr. Bruce A. MacNaught on the homestead. One son, Claude MacNaught, the supreme sacrifice in World War One. There are also three daughters: Mrs. John Dymment, (Kath) of Quincy, Mass.; Mrs. Charles G. Ellis, (Eurilla), of Melrose, Mass.; Mrs. James MacKay, (Julia) of Stoneham, Mass. One sister, Lily, resides at home and surviving also are two brothers: Captain William C. MacNaught of Portland, Oregon and James MacNaught of Preston Mass. His wife predeceased him in October 1930.
