SUMMERSIDIE's new golf professional, Bob Poole, a retired RCMP officer and decorated lieutenant in World War Two, is a chap who has already given plenty of pro instructions. One of his main objectives in Summerside will be to build a strong junior program.

A 1962 graduate of the Professional Golfers School, Poole has had pro work at the Chantler and Mississippi clubs. While in Florida he received instruction from Tommy Bolt, Tommy Arner, Gene Sarasin, Sam Snead and the late Horton Smith.

Poole first caught the "golf bug" at the age of 17, perfecting at the McKeel Golf Club in his native city of Ottawa. The pro there at that time was Allison Keer.

"Poole says he has worked hard to achieve his goal of becoming a pro, and readily passes along tips to the beginners."

Tips he gives include: Realize your own golf limitations; make certain when receiving instructions that all points are thoroughly understood; develop your own rhythm; don't be impatient with your progress; purchase clubs suitable for your game; learn to concentrate; and most important, remember it's a game.

Jack Neilson is "the best all around kook," Poole says. He hopes to begin instructions next week.

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Montreal Businessman Captures Skeet Cup

ST. JASPER, Que. (CP)—Harry Wilkie, 35, a Canadian Montreal businessman who sells autos for a living, captured the 40th annual Skeet Cup on Friday in a 40-gun event of the Canadian and Quebec skeet shooting championships.

Wilkie, who marked himself as an up-comer last week by winning the Ontario open, downed 75 straight birds on the last field.

"I was pretty nervous," he said about the miss. "I didn't concentrate enough."

His closest rivals, both with 97, were Howard Conner, a Detroit machine shop owner, Tom J. Heffron, of Grafton, N.Y., and Howard Conner, C. J. Crites, a Detroit business man, captured the two-man team trophy in the 410 with a combined score of 193. Crites shot 97, Wilkie 96.

Competition in the 410, which has the smallest bore of the four guns used in skeet shooting, took up most of the opening day of the three-day meet. The field of 290 still must test their skills using 20, 28 and 12-gauge shotguns.

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Montreal Vice President Retires To Private Life

MONTREAL (CP)—Ken Reardon, once a star defenseman with Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League, resigned from the club's executive Friday for "business and personal reasons."

Reardon, 43 said he wants a job that will permit him to spend more time with his children in their formative years.

He had been in the Canadiens organization since 1949, for the last eight years as vice-president and assistant general manager of the club and the Canadian Arena Company.

Senior Hartland Molson, owner of the Canadiens, said he accepted Reardon's resignation with a great deal of regret.

Reardon said his decision, which took hockey people here somewhat by surprise, was "a hard one to make."

He declined to say what he will do next. He had "several promising offers" from business firms and would take time off to consider them.

A return to hockey elsewhere seemed out of the question.

"I'm serious about wanting to spend more time with my wife and children," he said, "and I've found that hockey has cut deeply into that part of my life. Any undertaking with any other hockey organization would place me in the same difficult situation, so I'm not interested in exploring that area."

"Right now, I would have to say that I'm through with hockey for good."

Reardon, a rugged, colorful defenseman with the Canadiens under the late coach Dick Irvin in the 1940s, retired as a player in 1956 only 10 years after coming into the NHL directly from junior hockey in Edmonton.
