Durrelle Wins Decision Over Besmanoff Wed.

DETROIT (AP)—Yvon Durrelle of Belle Ste. Anne, N.B., Wednesday night won a unanimous 10-round decision over German heavyweight Willie Besmanoff.

Besmanoff fought in at 189 pounds and Durrelle weighed 177 1/2.

Despite a weight disadvantage of nearly 12 pounds, Durrelle kept after his bigger opponent with looping left hands. There were no knockdowns in this, low-to-loe slugger match that brought the crowd to its feet in the 10th round with cheers.

Besmanoff was the better boxer and had the better of the early going, but the 27-year-old Durrelle who fought to a 10-round draw with Tony Ianzi in the same stadium last June, rallied in the late stages for his seventh win in the last eight starts.

Judge Jack Aspery scored it 36-45. Judge Ed Wagonlander had it 47-38 and referee Tom Briscoe scored it 47-44, all in Durrelle favor. The Associated Press had Durrelle in front 46-45.

Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore said after knocking out Anthony in the seventh round last week that he would like to take on Durrelle within the next six weeks. But Durrelle, British Empire light heavyweight champion was much sharper against Anthony than he was Wednesday night against Besmanoff.

Besmanoff seemed to tire after the sixth round and Durrelle was able to score with lunging loop-

ing left hooks. This was Besmanoff's fifth fight in this country since he arrived earlier in the year from Munich, Germany. It was his third defeat for the husky 25-year-old whose biggest victory was over heavy weight Bob Baker.

The bout was scored under the five-point must system. A crowd of 1,044 paid a gross gate of \$1,762.30.

Cards Rally To Defeat Braves

St. Louis Cardinals staged a four-run rally in the eighth inning Wednesday for a 4-1 victory over Milwaukee Braves. The Cards triumph, behind the effective pitching of winner Lindy McDaniel, enabled St. Louis to salvage the final game of the three-game series that saw the Braves clinch the 1957 National League pennant.

In the only other day game, Boston took a 7-4 victory over Washington in the American League.

The Braves scored their lone run in the fifth on an error by Blasingame on losing pitcher Bob Buhl's ground ball, and sacrifice flies by Red Schoendienst and Johnny Rod.

Buhl had a two-hit shutout going until the eighth inning when the Cards scored four runs on six hits.

In the big St. Louis frame, Stan Musial drove in the tying run with a pinch-hit single to left center. Two more tallies came in on Eddie Kasko's single to center through a drawn-in infield.

The victory clinched the second-place spot in the National League for the Cardinals.

Boston's Frank Malzone hit his second homer of the game to open the eleventh inning to give Boston the win.

Ike Delock, third Red Sox pitcher, was the winning pitcher. Jackie Jensen and Jim Pearsal also connected for the Red Sox while Art Schult and Harmon Killebrew hit homers for the Senators.

Malzone's second blast was off loser Camilo Pascual.

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Garden lined a two-run, ninth-inning single that gave Baltimore a 4-2 nightcap victory over the New York Yankees and souped up Whitey Ford, who probably will pitch the world series opener, Wednesday night. The American League champs won the opener of the two-night pair 5-1 with Don Larsen and Bobby Shantz checking the Orioles on five hits.

CHICAGO (AP)—Lefty Billy Hoelt of the Detroit Tigers Wednesday night shut out the second-place Chicago White Sox 5-0 on a five-hit job.

Hoelt, getting his 9th victory against 11 setbacks, struck out eight batters and walked two. Two of the hits were doubles—by Minnie Minoso, in the fourth inning for the first hit, and by pinch batter Sherman Lollar in the eighth.

Lollar's double and Ted Beard's single in succession made up the Sox only threat in the eighth but a double play erased it.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Chicago's Cubs blasted Jay Hook, Cincinnati's \$65,000 bonus baby, from the mound in his major league starting debut Wednesday night, winning 7 to 5 even as Moe Drabowsky, their own bonus find, was yanked after yielding two ninth. The former Trinity College star previously had allowed but four hits.

Smythe Charges Lindsay Is Throwing Threats, Charges

TORONTO (CP)—President Conn Smythe of Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens Wednesday accused Ted Lindsay of "throwing threats and charges around just like he swings his stick on the ice."

Smythe was refuting claims made by Lindsay, president of Players Association, that the league and club owners were violating the law requiring employers in the United States and Canada to bargain in good faith with employees' representatives.

Lindsay said at St. Catharines, Ont., Tuesday the organization's New York lawyer, J. Norman Lewis, would file charges on that basis, but denied that his group was planning immediate court action.

He said: "We are applying to the national labor relations board in New York for certification.

When it comes through, we'll sit down and talk with the four U.S. clubs. We expect the two Canadian clubs, Toronto and Montreal, will have to follow suit, after all it's a league, and the discussions which affect the U.S. clubs must affect Toronto and Montreal."

Included in the players association demands were more say in the pension fund, more security, automatic pay raises, and fringe benefits.

Smythe said: "I already have an excellent pension funds." "Perhaps this whole uproar over player demands is actually a smokescreen planned by Lindsay to demoralize our team."

Smythe added: "He has always been a hard worker for his club on the ice. Now it looks like he's working just as hard off the ice."
