LONDON, Aug. 3 - (Reuter) - Only 48 British officers and 15 other ranks were reported prisoners of war in Korea up to July 29, it was announced today. Those reported missing totalled 1,044.

Important Discoveries Of Iron, Copper, Gold Reported From Quebec

QUEBEC, Aug. 3 - (CP) - Premier Duplessis today announced what he described as important discoveries of iron, copper and gold in the Quebec mining areas of Ungava and Chibougamau. The Premier told his weekly press conference that the Quebec Labrador Development Company Ltd. has reported a rich iron discovery 170 miles northwest of Ungava by the Hollinger North Shore Exploration Company.

Premier Duplessis said 1,000,000 tons of copper and gold ore have been located by Campbell Chibougamau Mines Ltd. on Merrill Island, in Dore Lake, a half-mile from Chibougamau Township. He said E. O. D. Campbell, president of the company, has informed Quebec Mines Department of plans to sink mine shafts to work the copper and gold finds.

He said the government takes credit for "wise and foresighted" administration of the 31,000-square-mile territory of Ungava, since only 3,000 square miles has been leased to the Hollinger Company for exploration and the company's final development leases will cover only 300 square miles.

Britain, Iran To Seek Settlement Of Oil Dispute

By James M. Long TEHRAN, Iran, Aug. 3 - (AP) - Britain and Iran agreed formally today to seek a roundtable settlement of the Iranian oil dispute. A cabinet mission left London by plane for Tehran.

The leader of the mission, Richard R. Stokes, Lord Privy Seal, said before the takeoff he hopes to see Premier Mohammed Mossadeq Sunday for a fresh start on negotiations that broke down in June. The mission is to arrive tomorrow.

Britain has accepted the "principle of nationalizing the oil industry in Iran." This was stated to mean the Iranians will control oil "exploration, extraction and exploitation."

Iran agreed that she will negotiate with Britain on how she will take over the vast oil resources. Up to this year, the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company had exclusive charge of oil operations in Iran.

The British Government owns controlling interest in the A. I. O. C., a \$1,400,000,000 company.

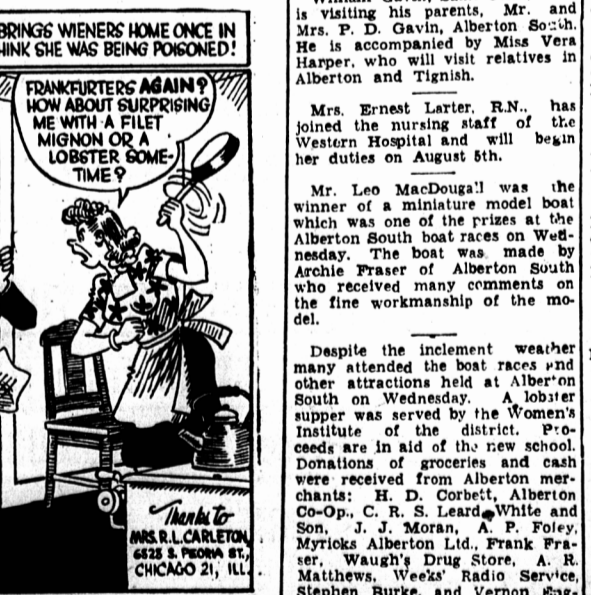
