Guest Speaker Discusses Education For Personnel

Dr. J.A. MacMillan, guest speaker at the luncheon of the Hospital Association of P.E.I. which held its annual meeting in the Basilica Recreation Centre yesterday, spoke on 'Education for Hospital Personnel'. He noted that there is a trend toward educating nursing students in universities rather than in hospitals, and discussed the controversy over two and three-year courses for student nurses. He stated that he definitely expects all professional fields to establish collective bargaining in the future, including nurses, lab and x-ray technicians.

The members of the new executive elected at the meeting are Dr. F.A. MacMillan, president; C.E. Praugh, treasurer; W.C. Sinnott, secretary; J.E. Milligan, 1st vice-president; Sister Mary David, 2nd vice-president.

During the morning, the meeting heard the report of the president, H.T. Holman of Summerside, and had a discussion of the report and of business matters.

In his report Mr. Holman noted that the salary range committee had been working hard on one of the most important tasks of the association - improving the salaries and working conditions of all hospital employees.

Some of the committee's recommendations have gone into effect in the new salary scale that started April 1.

Member hospitals of the Association are the Western Hospital, Charlottetown Hospital, P.E.I. Hospital, provincial sanatorium and rehabilitation centre, Kings County Memorial Hospital, O'Leary Community Hospital, Souris Hospital, Prince County Hospital and the Stewart Memorial Health Centre.

Akery, Minister of Agriculture for Nova Scotia, to join him in united representations to the Federal Government on behalf of Maritime dairy farmers who have just learned that no deficiency payment will be paid by the federal Agricultural Stabilization Board for the support year ending March 31st, 1966.

Mr. MacRae said that the announcement from the Agricultural Stabilization Board comes as a shock to Maritime dairy farmers, especially to Prince Edward Island's 6,000 dairy farmers.

The Minister said that dairy farmers have good grounds for demanding that Ottawa reconsider the decision of the Stabilization Board. "The Board is supposed to provide deficiency payments to bring the weighted average price for milk up to \$3.30 per hundredweight. This year, the Board announced that the weighted average price amount to \$3.32 per hundredweight, which is certainly in excess of what our island producers received for their milk," he said.

"It boils down to a question of how the Board calculated the weighted average price at \$3.32. I simply can't understand how they arrived at such a figure," the Minister said.

"The weighted price to P.E.I. producers was actually in the vicinity of \$2.97 per hundredweight," Mr. MacRae said. It would take mathematical contortions to try to prove, as the federal government is now trying to prove, that the average price was \$3.32, he added.

Mr. MacRae said he had heard reliably that in arriving at the figure of \$3.32 for weighted average price, Ottawa had included in its calculations subsidies paid by the factories, on coolers, bulk handling, patronage dividends at co-ops and transportation subsidies.

It is in this case, Mr. MacRae said, we will have to try to convince Ottawa to change the basis for the calculations, because both the basis and the calculations themselves are completely unrealistic and misleading.
