New Roles And New Weapons Make Different Demands

OTTAWA (CP)—New roles and weapons for the armed forces are giving rise to new problems in maintenance of morale, defence officials say.
Canadian participation in the United Nations Emergency Force is a case in point. Almost overnight, soldiers have had to accept an almost complete reversal of the philosophy of armed forces.
Officials put the problem this way:
Here were nearly 1,000 Canadian soldiers taught ever since they had joined the army the most efficient methods of killing. Suddenly, they were thrown into the Middle East between two hostile forces with orders not to shoot, though still being permitted to carry their arms. They were to act only as police and to defend themselves with rifle fire only as a last resort.
CANADIAN FIRED ON
For instance, there was the case of the Canadian soldier who was fired on beside the Suez Canal while driving in his jeep. The ordinary reaction for a soldier in such circumstances would have been to hit the dirt and return the fire. Instead, he merely reported the incident to the United Nations.
Officials said Friday this apparent paradox of soldiers not acting as soldiers but as somebody else cannot but have an adverse effect on morale. Not that Canadian soldiers want to get into it where else, but acting as policemen, they find it more difficult to think of themselves as soldiers.
External Affairs Minister Pearson has proposed that various countries, Canada included, designate units of their armed forces for United Nations duty.
SPECIAL UNIT
If such a scheme were accepted—it has brought little or no response in the UN—the Canadian army might have to train one unit apart for such police duties rather than soldiers.
Officials say another major morale and consequently efficiency in the higher squadrons are high because the aircrews take pride in their flying ability and the groundcrews in seeing that the aircraft are ready to fly.
But they ask, how will it be possible to maintain good morale when the weapon is not an aircraft but a guided missile?
The missile will be unmanned and there will be precious few of them to fire off in exercises because they are so expensive.
A soldier can take pride in proper maintenance of his rifle because it is his personal protection. But how can any serviceman take any particular pride in a missile?

Sudden Death At Church Of Summerside Man
A devout churchman and highly respected citizen of Summerside, Daniel John MacLeod, Convent St., passed away suddenly yesterday morning while attending service at Trinity United Church. Although Mr. MacLeod had been suffering from a heart ailment for the past year and a half, he was in reasonably good health and took charge of his business interests until the time of his death.
Mr. MacLeod, who was in his 77th year, was born in Victoria West and moved to Summerside with his father and mother, Malcolm D. MacLeod and the former Flora MacArthur, about 35 years ago.
In his earlier life he spent a brief period in Western Canada where for a while he was a surveyor in Northern Saskatchewan, but his main interest was farming and with his father was successful in this field at O'Leary, Linkletter Road and other points on P.E.I. where they established farms. Mr. MacLeod was also a member of the Summerside Police force in his younger days.
He was a dedicated church worker and served as superintendent of Trinity United Church Sunday School for several years as well as being an Elder of that church.
He is survived by his wife, the former Euphemia Matheson of Bradshaw, whom he married about 14 years ago and one brother Samuel, in Los Angeles, California who visited Mr. MacLeod last summer.
The funeral will be held on Tuesday at 2:00 from Trinity United Church.

Reports Ku Klux Klan Opens Branch In Britain

LONDON (Reuters) — The Ku Klux Klan has opened a branch in Britain, the Reynolds News reports in its Sunday edition.
The left-wing newspaper says Britons are being invited to join the "aryan knights Ku Klux Klan, realm of Britain and Texas" on payment of a 10-shilling entrance fee and an annual dues of £1 (about \$2.75).
Recruits sign an oath of allegiance saying "I believe in the Klan tenets and I will obey its laws."
The newspaper says that accepted members receive supplies of Ku Klux Klan membership application forms and propaganda leaflets containing a "mixture of racial hatred and blasphemy."
"Thousands of these leaflets, application forms and red Ku Klux Klan stickers have been sent openly into Britain through the customs."
NOT ILLEGAL HERE
"For the Ku Klux Klan is not an illegal organization."
"How is this covenant of hate being organized in Britain?"
"An application sent to the Klan's contact in Waco, Tex., Horace Sherman Miller, whose address appears on the leaflets—results in him notifying a go-between in the nearest British Klan cell."
"The British agents work chiefly into this country."
"At the moment, we are only at the beginning. But there will be a rumpus when we come out in public."
WILL SEEK REGISTRATION
"We are going to get the Ku Klux Klan registered... as an official organization, but the registration will probably be done from America, not by anyone in this country."
Asked whether the Klan would also be antagonistic to Jews, the go-between is reported as saying: "We would be sticking our necks out to attack them openly. They are too powerful and influential... they will be taken care of by individual and anonymous action from time to time."
Reynolds News adds that special branch officers of Scotland Yard have copies of the Klan literature.
In Birmingham Mrs. Joan Tomlinson, head of the city's welfare committee, plans to ask the chief constable to investigate the Klan's activities.
She is quoted as saying: "For some time I have been aware that we had an organization in our midst out to stir up racial hatred."

Jordan's King Relies On The Loyalty Of The Bedouins

LONDON (Reuters)—King Hussein now appears to be banking everything—his throne and the continued independence of his kingdom—on the traditional loyalty of the Bedouin tribes who helped his grandfather, Emir Abdullah, carve out the desert kingdom after the First World War.
The Bedouin—and the land-owning families of Transjordan (that part of the country lying on the east bank of the Jordan River)—form the only solid and trustworthy support that the young monarch can rely on in the present crisis.
But in numbers this support is only a minority fragment of present-day Jordan's 1,500,000 population. Arab refugees from Palestine make up a third and almost another third reside or have their roots on the Palestinian west bank of the river.
Embittered by the division of Palestine and the creation of Israel, Jordans' Palestinian population—particularly the impoverished refugees—is overwhelmingly opposed to the West.
The king then can rely only on the absolute, unwavering support of about 5,000 Jordan Bedouins in the army—about a quarter of its total of 20,000 men.
RESPECTED GLUBB
Among the many stories that went around Amman at the time of the dismissal of Lt.-Gen. Sir John Glubb, British commander of the Arab Legion, was that of the reported split between the palace and the Bedouin tribes.
Glubb was loved and respected by the Bedouin and the tribes were said to be on the verge of revolt and only restrained by their chiefs' pointing out that their first and only loyalty was to the throne.
It appears that it is on that rigid degree of loyalty that the king now is basing his actions and hopes of retaining his authority.
For Hussein today the biggest question mark appears to be: he is able to retain control of the country against the mob elements which could, at any moment, launch an all-out attack on his throne and his person?
