When Mickey Mantle poled a home run in Yankee Stadium last week, those who live on statistics might be interested in these few points. A tape measure showed that the drive into the left-centre field bleachers struck 78 feet on the fly. Mickey is only the seventh player even to hit a ball into that distant sector of spacious Yankee Stadium. Joe Dimaggio did it twice. Others were Hank Greenberg, Jimmy Foy, Gus Zernial, Andy Carey and Jim Lemon.

Mickey is certainly not going the home runs out at any record clip. Of course he's improved lately and it's a long way to the end of the 154 game schedule. The Los Angeles fans really turned out in record breaking numbers for the last series at the Coliseum with the world champion Milwaukee Braves. They came to see what their darlings could do with the mighty Braves and what they saw certainly must have pleased them to no end. The only thing that bothered the faithful Los Angeles fans was why the Dodgers hadn't been doing things like that since early April. But then they consoled themselves by saying that perhaps it's still not too late.

The hard hitting Cincinnati Redlegs were in just previous to the Braves and folks must have been short of money and were saving what little they had for a look at the champions of the baseball world. The night before the Braves opened in the Coliseum the Redlegs drew exactly 8,440 which is mere peanuts for Los Angeles.

Perhaps they sensed a lacing that night as the men of Birdie Tebbets easily trounced the Alston-coached crew 8-4. On top of that Cincinnati routed Carl Erskine who is currently making such a gallant comeback.

Guess the Dodgers would like to play the Braves every day. And still on those Dodgers. Just before the Milwaukee series, Dodger Captain Pee Wee Reese was questioned concerning baseball illnesses affecting the once-considered pennant contenders.

Once one of the game's greatest competitors, Pee wee wasn't hesitant about giving his idea of what was the trouble. Said the Dodger Captain: "There have been a lot of things that contributed to our troubles but probably the most important is the fact that we have lost some of our best manpower in the last two years. Five all-time Dodgers players who were winning pennants in 1955 and 1956 are contributing little or nothing to the 1958 club. Jackie Robinson retired after the 1956 season. Then Roy Campanella cracks up his car last winter and we lose him. The other three? They're on this team, Hodges, Snider and some guy named Reese."

Pee Wee has something there. When that quintet was really in operation the other seven National League clubs knew they were in for loads of trouble.

Bill Rigney claims he is not surprised that his rookies have done so splendidly so far this season. While other express amazement at the way Bill's youngsters are carrying on, Rigney calmly states that this comes as no great surprise to him. He reasons in this way: "We let fellows like Bobby Thomson and Don Mueller go, and don't forget these were regulars a year ago. Why shouldn't these kids who have talent, also have confidence when they see they have displaced players with reputations like that?"

It is good reasoning but the trouble is that many cases is that it doesn't always follow that these rookies are able to make a club forget the old guard that they traded away. However Cepeda, Davenport and Company are doing their level best to make Giant fans forget they ever had fellows named Thomson or Mueller.

Early Wynn doesn't mince his words. He's not trying to let anybody think that he is sticking around baseball because he loves it. The Chicago White Sox hurler bluntly puts it this way: "To me baseball is strictly a business. I figure it means \$1,000 to me every time I go out there to the mound. It's purely a business deal, just as it would be for a banker or anyone else in private enterprise. If I do well, I've helped myself financially. If I don't, I've cost myself a chance to make money."

Sounds like good business. Yesterday we mentioned the great pitching performance of Murray Dickson who lost a heart-breaking 3-2 decision to New York Yankees in 12 innings. Dickson is nearing 43.

That recalled another great hurling chore recently put on by San Francisco's Marv Grissom. Grissom's chance came against Milwaukee Braves. He was summoned to the mound in the eighth inning with one out, two runs already in and Braves occupying two of the available three bases. For the next three and two-thirds innings he cranked a baffling assortment of pitches out of his 40-year-old right arm as he performed a chore that had proved too much for six of his junior partners. He faced 11 Braves and retired 11 without giving up a hit. While he didn't get the victory, he held the visitors in check until his mates could organize a winning offensive.

Not bad at all for a 40-year-old youngster. Chicago White Sox and Baltimore played all Friday night and into Saturday morning and when they had finished 14 innings they were told they had to do it all over again.

It was a tough break all the way around. Baltimore led 4-0 going into the ninth inning and appeared to have the game in the bag. However the White Sox rallied for five big runs to go ahead 5-4 as the Orioles came to bat in the last of the ninth. The Birds got one back to knot matters at 5-5 and send the game into extra innings. And they played five extra innings without either team being able to muster a tally. Finally the cutoff on night ball games caught up with them and after a long evening—and part of a morning—of baseball the affair was ordered replayed.

That sure was a lot of hard work for nothing. It took a rookie to break the pitcher's jinx that has been plaguing Milwaukee Braves.

Ten starting hurlers had failed to be around at the finish for manager Fred Haney and naturally Haney was becoming just a wee bit worried. He figured it was about time for a change and left the old guard and went looking for new blood. He selected Joey Jay, a 22-year-old hurler who has been acclaimed as another Warren Spahn. Joey responded in terrific fashion blanking the St. Louis Cardinals and keeping Milwaukee in front with a 2-0 victory.

Jay has likely earned himself a regular berth on the starting pitchers roster. It could mean real trouble for other pennant-minded teams in the National League.

# Durrelle's Next Battle Depends On Deal Offered

MONCTON (CP)—Manager Chris Shaban said Sunday night where and when Yvon Durrelle, British Empire and Canadian Light Heavyweight Champion, fights depends on where the financial deal can be made. "I still haven't signed anything," said Shaban. "I'm still considering an offer from Vancouver promoter Earl Kalani regarding a title shot with Archie Moore, and the defence of Durrelle's British Empire crown against Mike Holt of South Africa, in Montreal, July 16."

"Durrelle isn't going to fight for nothing." "If Kalani would give me a substantial guarantee, say about \$15,000 for Moore I'd take it right away."

Shaban was also in touch with the International Boxing Club over the weekend. The IBC wants to promote a Durrelle-Holt title fight in Montreal with promoter Eddie Quinn.

"The IBC wants to give each man about the same percentage," said Shaban. "and I can't see that."

# Tommy Bolt Captures U.S. Open Golf Championship

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Tommy Bolt won the United States Open Golf Championship Saturday with a remarkable self and shot control. He shot rounds of 69 and 72 for a 72-hole score of 283.

The jut-jawed, 39-year-old southwesterner, born in Oklahoma and reared in Louisiana, crushed the hopes of South Africa's young Gary Player with a staggering streak of birdies in the morning and then snuffed out the late challenge of Gene Littler.

Player, the 22-year-old precisionist from Johannesburg, finished four strokes back of the

new champion with rounds of 73 and 71 for 287.

Littler, from El Cajon, Calif., surged out of nowhere with a brilliant three-under-par 67 in the morning to move within three strokes of the pace-setter, but his bid died in the sweltering afternoon sun as Bolt surged home.

Other bids faded one by one through a day when temperatures reached 100 and Southern Hills' 6,907-yard course and 35-35-70 par took on a night-marish hue in the latter stages of the gruelling 36-hole windup.

FALL FROM CONTENTION  
Ben Hogan, seeking a record fifth Open victory with an aching left wrist, fell out of contention early and he was followed by Frank Stranahan, Julius Borros, Charles Coe and Labron Harris, who were in pressing position entering the final day.

Jimmy Demaret, playing in his 15th Open, found conditions so tough he withdrew after shooting an 81 in the morning round.

The only Canadian competitor Jerry Magee of Toronto, shot rounds of 75 and 70 for a 72-hole score of 298—good for \$500 prize money. Bolt kicked up \$3,000.

The man who has been called The Terrible Tempered Mister Bolt, and who has accused galleries of being against him, got a tremendous ovation when he sank a four-foot putt for his par on the final hole. The crowd was estimated at close to 20,000.
