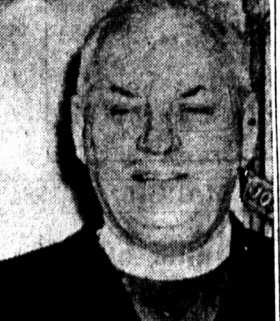
### KITCHENER GETS TV

### Red Cross First Aid Committee Holds Meeting

Dr. A. J. Murchison presided at a meeting of the Red Cross first aid committee on Tuesday at Red Cross Headquarters.

Mrs. Harry W. Cudmore, director of the First Aid Services reported that 22 standard classes are in progress at the present time. The total enrollment of these groups is 408 men and women. The weekly sessions are conducted by 19 qualified first aid instructors.

The committee considered a request for a first aid post received from the school trustees at Oyster Bed Bridge. It was decided that this community would benefit by this Red Cross service and a post will be established there immediately. Mr. and Mrs. Berthausme, both registered nurses, have been recommended as attendants for this first aid post.

Monthly reports from first aid posts indicate that 39 persons have received treatment during January and February.

Plans were discussed for instructor refresher courses in Tighefish, Summerside and Charlottetown. It was decided that as many first aid post attendants wished advanced training, this should be made available at different centres throughout the Province this spring.

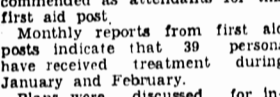
The organization of another standard first aid class for Charlottetown was discussed. It was decided that a class would be conducted either in the evening or the afternoon if 15 applications were received.

Mr. Smallwood's 23-member Liberal party will be facing practically the same opposition as last year. The five opposition seats this year are held by Progressive Conservatives while last year there were four Conservatives and one independent. There are no vacancies.

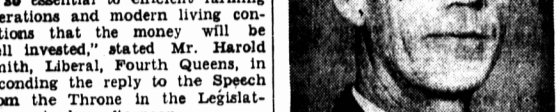
## Suggests Technical Expert To Aid In Food Processing

"It is gratifying to know that our Government has taken definite steps towards extending the services of electricity to all districts in the Province. It is my personal opinion that it will cost the Government considerably more than is anticipated at this time but I do feel that electrification is so essential to efficient farming operations and modern living conditions that the money will be well invested," stated Mr. Harold Smith, Liberal, Fourth Queens, in responding to the speech from the Throne in the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

"I feel that this is not money spent but it is really an investment in our Province and our people that will, over a period of time, return great financial and social dividends," he continued.

Mr. Smith, elected last year to succeed Senator J. Walter Jones in the Fourth District, was making his maiden speech in the Assembly.

"I believe the Government should engage a technical expert immediately from the food processing industry who will be able to explain to our food canning plants the correct pack and quality of product that is required by the consumer public," he stated in discussing the small fruit industry.



Mr. Harold P. Smith commended the Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways for the work carried on by his Department. "I believe the policy of building secondary roads is the answer to many of our transportation problems. It would be a splendid thing to have more paved highways if we could afford them and I feel that the policy of building more improved roads will result in a splendid highway system in two or three years' time."

"The Trans-Canada Highway when completed will be a boon to our own people as well as an added attraction to our tourist trade which is growing from year to year. I am pleased to see in the speech from the Throne that further assistance to promote the tourist industry is being proposed.

### Assistance for Students

"I also commend very highly their proposal for increased funds for teachers' salaries, senior high schools and education in general, realizing that our country's future depends on the boys and girls of today. I think the best we can do for them is none too good. This being an agricultural Province I would suggest that more opportunities be provided in the public school curriculum for the study of agricultural science and more encouragement and assistance be given in providing scholarships.

Mr. Edison B. Mutch, of North River, left yesterday morning with his herd sire Jester's Standard Dreamer 11584 to make delivery to William Hollar, Pataaska, Ohio, who recently purchased this champion animal at a price well up in four figures. The price is said to be the highest ever paid for a Jersey bull in Eastern Canada.

Jester's Standard Dreamer 11584 was born on the Mutch farm at North River on August 9, 1947, where he has remained ever since except when on show at Charlottetown, the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst and the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto in succession of prize winning events.

His greatest record in the show ring was achieved in 1952 when he was acclaimed Grand Champion at the Royal Winter Fair in 1952. He also headed his class in aged bulls at the same show place in 1953.

His dam, Dreamers Maid 121124 was also bred and born on the Mutch farm. This cow has an exceptionally fine record with a butterfat showing of 888 pounds in one lactation period. She also has to her credit three high rated daughters being classified as "Excellent" by the scoring committee
