Play-off games are the order of the day. The O'Leary Midgits will soon be taking on the Summerside Kidmids for the championship of Prince County. The winner of this series will probably have to play Charlottetown for the Island title. The Kensington and Summerside juveniles will probably fight it out for Prince County honors with odds on Kensington to win this round, and the winner will try conclusions with the smooth Abegweit team from Charlottetown. We would be inclined to give the Abbies a very slight edge on this series, but think the Kensington lads might come through.

We were rather surprised to notice that a Kensington hockey fan got rather upset because the Charlottetown scribe referred to Kensington's 7 to 4 win over the Abbies as an "upset" victory. Personally, if we were coaching or even backing a team, we'd be tickled pink every time a sports writer called a win by our team an "upset" victory. Scoring "upset" victories is what adds spice and thrills to all kinds of competitive sports. If our team is expected to win and does, well that's good, but not very exciting. It's when the underdog snarls his way to an "upset" victory that we really get a thrill.

Furthermore, Kensington lads' 7 to 4 win over the Abegweits was an upset victory. Kensington did not have ice until well into the second week in January, while the juvenile Abbies were skating and practising hockey long before Christmas. Kensington had very few boys to pick from as compared to the Abegweits who had a much larger group from which to choose their team. The Abbies have been hailed as the strongest juvenile team to come out of Charlottetown in some years and we believe they are. Yet, in spite of all this, those chipper young sprouts from Kensington proceeded to beat the Charlottetown bluebloods by a margin of three goals! Upset victory? Well, say it was, and how the Kensington hockey fans, a dyed-in-the-wool, ripsnortin' band of hockey enthusiasts when they get something to cheer about, must have loved it!

Leonard Potrykus, pastor of a Roman Catholic Church, was beaten to death in his living quarters at the church last night. Deputy Sheriff's found the priest's blood-soaked body on the floor of his bedroom shortly after midnight.
