TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Railway Matters.

OTTAWA, May 13.

The veteran premier occupied the office of Minister of Railways to-day, and assisted by the Deputy Minister and Mr. Schreiber, gave the office a more business-like appearance than it has assumed for several years. It is understood that one of the matters under consideration was immediate arrangements for the survey of the Salisbury Short Line. The survey will be in charge of Vernon Smith, C. E., who is generally acknowledged to be one of the most experienced and reliable engineers in Canada. He has also the advantage of a knowledge of the country to be traversed, and the principal difficulties to be overcome. Mr. Smith leaves to-morrow for Fredericton, which he will make the base of operations, and from which he will dispatch his survey parties as soon as they can be organized.

British Politics.

LONDON, May 13.

In the House of Commons, Howarth, (Conservative), asked whether the Government, after the resignation of the Marquis of Londonderry from the Vice-Royalty of Ireland, would make a royal prince of the Viceroy and provide him with a suitable residence and retinue. Right Hon. Edward Honeage (Liberal-Unionist) asked the Government to consider the question of the abolition of the viceroyship and transfer the duties of the office to the chief secretary. Hon. Mr. Smith promised that the Government would earnestly consider the questions, but stated that in the meantime it was impossible to pledge the Government to any course.

The Usual Result.

HALIFAX, May 13.

On Sunday morning Mrs. Hopkins left her house at New Glasgow to go for milk. In her absence one of her children attempted to light the fire with kerosene and on her return she found the house in flames. Her youngest child, aged two years, was roasted alive in the building.

Trouble With Fishermen.

OTTAWA, May 13.

The Department of Customs have been informed of serious trouble with American fishing schooners at Antigonish, N. S. The official reports of the melee are not yet to hand, but it is reported that the lighthouse keeper and others were roughly handled by the Yankee law breakers.

Formally Opened.

MONTREAL, May 13.

The Mammoth New York Life Insurance building, the finest in Canada, costing half a million dollars, was formally opened to-day. There was a banquet and speeches by Hon. Mr. Chapleau, Peter Mitchell and others.

A Riotous Demonstration.

BERLIN, May 13.

A number of strikers attempted a riotous demonstration, but were charged upon and dispersed by the dragons and lancers. There was random firing between the strikers and military at that place.

A Strike Threatened.

MUNICH, May 13.

The metal workers and potters here threaten a strike unless wages are increased. A similar movement is apparent among artisans generally.

To Go To England.

OTTAWA, May 13.

Mr. Griffin, parliamentary librarian, will accompany Sir Charles Tupper to England. They leave Ottawa to-morrow.

The Chinese Exclusion Act.

WASHINGTON, May 13.

The Supreme Court to-day affirms the validity of the law excluding Chinese laborers known as the Scott Exclusion Act.

Retired On a Pension.

OTTAWA, May 13.

Judge Papineau, of Quebec, has been retired on a pension, owing to continued ill health.

Bishop Dead.

WASHINGTON, May 14.

Bishop, the mind reader, died here this morning.
