School Loans Get Approval

OTTAWA (Special)—Two loans to the board of school trustees of the Town of Summerside have been approved by the municipal development and loan board it was announced here Monday.

The loans are estimated at \$170,264 and \$252,000 and are for renovations to an elementary school and the construction of a new high school.

Both loans are repayable over 20 years and bear interest at 5 1/2 per cent per annum.

This brings to 14 the number of municipal development loans approved in Prince Edward Island, and their total amount of \$161,582.

For work completed by March 31, 1966, Summerside will benefit from a forgiveness of 25 per cent of the loan amount.

Indian Policy Stays Same

The Prince Edward Island government will not be taking over the control of Indian affairs in the province according to Premier Walter R. Shaw.

Recently Ontario assumed complete control over the Indians living in that province from the federal government.

The Premier said yesterday because we are a small province and have only a small Indian population things will be left in the hands of the federal government as they have in the past.

"I would like to see a broader integration of the Indians with the activities of the country," said the Premier. He expressed a desire that Indians take a larger part of the farming, fishing and business life of the province.

PROV. AFFAIRS

The P. E. I. Liberal leader will arrive in Ottawa on Friday afternoon. Saturday he will attend meetings of the national executive of the Liberal party and on Sunday will meet with other officials of the Liberal party's national organization.

On Monday he will be meeting with Prime Minister Pearson and other members of the cabinet.

"There are a great many matters of immediate and pressing concern to Prince Edward Islanders which will be discussed during my visit," said the new Liberal leader. He didn't give any indication what these matters were, but he did say he hoped to be able to make a number of announcements concerning the Island while he was in Ottawa.

Mr. Campbell will attend the opening of the House of Commons Tuesday and will be back on the Island Wednesday.

Archives Given Antique Articles

Three items of historical interest have recently been presented to the Public Archives of Prince Edward Island through the kindness of George Leard, Souris.

Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Muttart, formerly of Bedeque but now living in Toronto, donated a township or lot marker of dressed sandstone. The marker shows the legend "Lot XXII" on one side and "Lot XXIII" on the other, and is presumed to be one of the markers used by Capt. Samuel Holland during his original survey of Prince Edward Island. The marker was rescued from permanent burial by Mrs. Muttart when it was unearthed during road construction near her old home in Hazel Grove.

The Muttarts also presented the Archives with a medium-sized cannon ball which was unearthed by Mr. Muttart's father, Mr. Robert Muttart, while plowing on his Cape Traverse shore farm.

OLD HAND MILL
Of more recent discovery is an old quern or hand mill used for grinding barley meal and oat meal. The mill consists of two stones some twenty inches in diameter and bears the date 1741 which, if authentic, indicates that the history of this mill goes back to the early

days of French settlement on the Island. An unusual feature of this quern is that the stones were formed from sandstone; most stones of later and larger construction were made from granite or some such hard material.

The mill was discovered on the farm of Mr. Albert Campbell of Red Point, near Souris. Mr. Campbell declined to sell the mill, insisting that it be donated to an Island Museum for public display.

The articles were accepted on behalf of the Archives by Douglas Boylan, Provincial Archivist.
