# Rangers Cool Off Boston Bruins With 2-1 Victory

NEW YORK (AP)—Dean Prentice's goal early in the third period provided the margin of victory as New York Rangers defeated Boston Bruins 2-1 in a National Hockey League game here Wednesday night.

The victory pushed the Rangers into fourth place in the NHL over Toronto Maple Leafs, who were idle Wednesday. It was only the second loss for the first-place Bruins in their last 13 games, 10 of which they won.

Both teams failed to score in a cleanly played first period that saw only one penalty, to Boston's Fleming Mackell at 10:12.

The Rangers scored first, at 4:02 of the second period, when Andy Bathgate blew a shot past goalie Terry Sawchuk. Bill Gadsby and Danny Lewicki got credit for assists.

With less than two minutes to go in the period, right winger Jerry Toppazzini took a pass from Mackell to score the only goal allowed by the Rangers' net minder, Gump Worsley. The time was 18:36.

Prentice's game winning shot, with assists from Larry Poyein and Bruce Cline, came at 2:46 of the final period.

Worsley, playing one of his best games, made 38 stops for the Rangers. Sawchuk had 26.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—River Divide Farm's Decathlon with Willie Hartack in the saddle, equalled the world's record for 5½ furlongs Wednesday as it won the first division of Tropical Park's Inaugural Handicap, opening feature of Florida's racing season.

Decathlon, who rocks and rolls while he runs, carried 126 pounds and ran the distance in 1:03 1-5 to equal the record set by Nance's Ace at this track on Dec. 27, 1944, and tied by Bolt Bazooka at Hollywood Park in California on July 4, 1955.

Decathlon was the one to three favorite with the crowd of 14,246 and paid \$2.70.

## Prize Winning Horse Guards Sickly Burro

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A prize-winning show horse stood guard Wednesday over a shabby burro after other horses kicked the sickly little animal almost to death.

"She won't let any of the other horses go near him since they kicked him," said Dolores Robinson, 18-year-old owner of Blaze, winner of several ribbons and trophies.

"She even saves her food for the burro and will hardly eat anything unless he eats with her. They look real tragic because the burro is such a sickly little thing and Blaze is so sleek."

The burro was recently weakened by a cold and couldn't keep out of the way of other horses at the horse farm, Miss Robinson said. The horses have a natural dislike for burros, she added, and the sickly burro was kicked severely.

"Somebody moved him into another pasture with Blaze. He was just lying there in the grass and we all thought he was gone for sure when Blaze came up and started nuzzling him."

"None of us had ever seen anything like it. It's beyond me. Blaze can't stand any of the other burros and she doesn't even like the other horses."

Dolores added: "If he doesn't get better pretty soon, they might have to put him away. I just don't know what Blaze would do if the burro dies now."

## TOPS GOALS AND ASSISTS

## Orin Carver Is Leading Scorer

Orin Carver of Parkdale Flyers, a rightwinger turned centreman, ratted in 16 points on eight goals and a like number of assists in the last three Parkdale games to take over the scoring lead in the Island Senior B Hockey League by a wide margin.

Carver sniped a goal and assist while Parkdale was edging B.Y.C. 3-2 last Thursday; added three goals and three more helpers in a 7-5 win over Aces at Summerside Monday, and ran wild against Montague Tuesday when he scored four goals and four assists.

Carver now has 10 goals and 8 assists in four games which gives him a comfortable spread over Merrill Pineau of B.Y.C., an earlier leader, and brother Skip Carver tied for second with 11 points each. Pineau has 7 goals and four assists while Skip has four goals and seven assists.

Orin Carver's 10 goals and 8 assists are both high for the league. Parkdale coach Allie Carver holds down the fourth slot with four goals and 6 assists for 10 points.

Jim MacLeod of Parkdale and Apps Arsenault, Billy Hughes and Bubby Dowling all of Montague have nine points.

Dick Carroll and Stu MacLure have seven points. "Hane Doyle is still the top puckstopper in the league. Doyle has allowed only 7 goals in three games for a superb 2.33 average.

Parkdale's Frank Roper is next with an average of 3.75. Roper has allowed 15 goals in 4 games.

The Parkdale Flyers are leading the league being undefeated in four games for a perfect 1,000 average. B.Y.C. is in second position having lost one of 3 games for a .666 average. Montague is in third with .500 and Summerside fourth with two wins in six starts for an average of .333. S.D.U. is winless in three games.
