FUNERAL OF DR. BURKE At Georgetown Yesterday - Impressive Ceremonies - Church Draped. The funeral of the late Dr. William G. Burke, of Boston, took place at Georgetown yesterday on the arrival of the morning train on which the remains were taken to that place. A large concourse of people were present to meet the body and escort it in procession behind the hearse which was drawn by a span of black horses. The pall-bearers were J. A. Mathieson, W. W. Jenkins, Thomas Morrissey, Daniel Morrissey, Ernest McPhee and John McCormac. The mourners were, besides the male members of the family, Dr. Murphy, of Tignish, and Mr. J. J. Morrison, of Providence, brother-in-law, and Dr. Kelly, of Charlottetown, a great friend of the deceased. The Mass of Requiem was chanted by Rev. Father Burke, who, with the doctor's bereaved wife, accompanied the remains here, and who, assisted by the pastor, Rev. Father Phelan, performed the absolutions at the bier and at the grave. The altar was draped in black for the occasion. Owing to the lateness of the train and the want of information many of the doctor's friends here and elsewhere were unable to attend. At George own the deepest sympathy was manifested with the bereaved parents and friends of Dr. Burke, and throughout the whole province there is a feeling of regret at the early closing of a virtuous and promising life.

TEACHER'S CONVENTION - The annual convention of the Provincial Teacher's Association takes place in this city on Oct. 5th and 6th.

ISLAND STUDENTS - A number of students from various sections of the province left this morning for Halifax and Montreal. More go to-morrow.

THE BRENT - The Government steamer Brent returned to Charlottetown last evening after supplying the lighthouses at East Point Souris and Grand River.

ACCIDENT - Herbert Vanierstone had his hand jammed while working about the engine at Duchesne's factory this morning. Dr. H. Johnson attended him. The accident is not serious.

CIVIC ELECTION - The election to fill the vacancy on the Summerside Council Board caused by the death of Councillor McCleod will take place on Monday next. The candidates are S. H. Clarke and Geo Gardiner.

STILL MAKING HAY - A correspondent of the Antigonish Casket writes that paper: "There lives at Pictou, Ontario, Ann, widow of Roderick Chisholm. The old lady, who has reached the advanced age of 98, is remarkably active, for on the day this was written (Aug. 29th) she was engaged in raking hay in a meadow at some distance from the house. Working with her in the same field were her son and daughter, aged respectively 68 and 75 years.

A SMALL ZOO - A very interesting exhibition - a miniature "Zoo" - has been established on the market square near the weigh scales, by Mr. John McQuaid, of Little York. In the building which he has put up are shown his collection of poodles, fox and black and tan terriers, a very pretty squire terrier, guinea pigs, a wild Drake mated with a common duck and their family, and a large cage of canaries, parrots, robins and other birds.

SHAMEFUL NEGLECT - In December last, about three feet of the chimney in the Abram's Village Court House fell down, and, although it would only cost a few dollars to repair the damage, it has never yet been looked after, and by reason of the neglect, the roof of the building is beginning to sag. Further the sessions of the County Court had, owing to the above damage to the building, to be held in a private house last winter, as no fire could be kindled in the Court House. The Government must be in pretty sore straits if they cannot, for want of funds, attend to such small matters as the above. - Agriculturist.
