IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN MURRAY JENKINS

At Charlottetown, Victoria Ave., on June 23rd, there passed to his eternal rest an old and highly respected resident of Bethel, Lot 48, in the person of John Murray Jenkins.

The late Mr. Jenkins was born at Birch Hill in the year 1844 and at the time of his death had reached the advanced age of 91 years and 6 months. In early married life he, with his wife took up farming at Bethel, where they laboured until owing to advanced age they sold out their homestead and removed to Charlottetown over seven years ago.

Mr. Jenkins was a consistent member of the Church of Scotland having been ordained an Elder in early manhood. He died as he had lived, firmly trusting in the will of God. Although of a retiring disposition he always took a keen interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the community in which he lived.

During his years of infirmity he was frequently visited by his beloved pastor Rev. Ewen McDougall. He leaves to mourn his wife, formerly Jessie Myers of Hazelbrook; five sons, Charles H. Diplomats See Difficulty In Jap Smuggling

(By The Associated Press)
NANKING, July 14—Continued refusal by Japan to prevent her nationals from smuggling manufactured goods and raw materials into China and the consequent enforcement by China's central authorities of drastic preventive measures is hurrying Sino-Japanese relations toward a crisis of the gravest nature, in the opinion of international authorities at the Chinese capital.

Highest Chinese authorities at Nanking admit unofficially the complications of the north China situation render it impossible for China to prevent the smuggling of merchandise into Hopei and Chahar by Japanese and Koreans.

Nanking further appreciates the difficulty of keeping these illicitly-imported goods from penetrating into the hinterland as long as Japanese troops are in virtual control of the Hopei terminal of railroads and highways.

The Chinese national authorities, however, are determined to enforce their special anti-smuggling regulations south of the Yellow River, and to use military and police force against persons suspected of transporting contraband, whatever their nationality.

The Japanese embassy has not professed against the arrest of Japanese nationals caught conveying smuggled goods to potential markets in north Kiangsu province, for the time being remaining content to repatriate Japanese turned over to the Japanese consulates concerned.

Some time ago the embassy expressed fears that as of armed force against smugglers might lead to serious incidents. Just such a one developed June 22 when a Chinese customs cutter fired on a steamer of Japanese register in the gulf of Chihli.

Revival in some form of the anti-Japanese boycott is another development which Japanese authorities in China foresee as a possible result of the situation. Such a result, state Japanese spokesmen, could cause only grave consequences.

Since the cessation of the 1931 boycott, merchandise bearing the "made in Japan" label has found its way to some of China's principal markets. Cotton and artificial silk are to be found on the shelves of all leading stores in Nanking. Radio sets and pars are in use in thousands of homes.

The success of Japanese factories in turning out automobile tires which look like well-known European brands but which cost about half as much, had an officially-muffled echo in Nanking recently when the capital's only bus company signed a contract with a Japanese concern to supply tires for the whole fleet of buses which provide transportation for Nanking's million inhabitants.

In time of emergency these Japanese-tired buses would be commandeered to transport troops and war supplies.

New York-Bermuda Air Service Projected

(C. F. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, July 15—Preparations are under way looking to the establishment of an air mail and passenger service between Bermuda and the United States this autumn, the air ministry announced today.

The announcement said it was planned to establish a weekly airplane service for passengers, mail and freight.

A subsidy will be paid by the Colonial Office to meet the cost of a flying boat for the service. Rates to be paid for the conveyance of mails on behalf of British and other postal administrations have yet to be determined, the ministry said.

The projected service eventually would become a link in the planned trans-Atlantic airplane service, concerning which representatives of Great Britain, the United States, Canada, the Irish Free State and Newfoundland conferred last autumn in Ottawa and Washington.

The air ministry's statement was as follows:

"It is proposed to conclude an agreement with Imperial Airways for the establishment in the autumn of 1936 of a regular weekly air service for passengers, mails and freight between Bermuda and New York or such other place in the United States as may be agreed upon by the Secretary of State for Air and the company.

"The service will be operated on a frequency of not less than one flight weekly in each direction. It will not only serve to improve communication with Bermuda but afford valuable experience in aircraft operation in that part of the North Atlantic.

"The company, with the assistance of a capital grant not exceeding £24,500 (\$172,500), will provide a flying boat similar to those proposed for the operation of main airline routes with the necessary spare engines, etc., for the operation of the service. The capital grant will be made from the colonial development fund to the government of Bermuda, who will make the necessary payments to the company.

"The agreement will continue for five years from the date of starting the first completed flight. In the event of operation being curtailed owing to default or financial difficulties by the company, a proportional repayment of the capital grant will be required.

"The maximum amount of subsidy payable to the company if a regular weekly service is maintained will be at the rate of £18,100 (\$90,500) per annum. Provision will be made for abatement of the subsidy should the number of flights fall below the approved minimum.

"The company will be required to make its own arrangements for ground service and airfield facilities.

"Suitable arrangements for the necessary services and facilities in Bermuda already have been concluded with the government of Bermuda, who also are contributing £2,320 (\$16,500) per annum towards the subsidy.

"The rates to be paid for the conveyance of mails on behalf of British and other postal administrations will be subject to separate agreement."

It was understood in New York that Pan-American Airways would co-operate with Imperial Airways in establishing the projected service. The British subsidy would permit carriage of mails from Bermuda to the United States while the United States government is expected to provide a subsidy which would permit carriage of mails from that country to Bermuda.
