

New Cunarder To Be  
Launched Nov. 22

GLASGOW (CP)—Mrs Norman  
Brettson, wife of the Canadian  
fish commissioner in London, will  
name the newest Cunard liner  
No. 22 at a launching ceremony,  
it was announced Monday.  
The 22,000-ton ocean liner will  
enter the water from John  
Brown's Clydebank shipyards,  
with the elegant name of Syl-  
vania.  
But, oddly enough, no one  
knows the origin of the ship's  
name, except that it goes well  
with the sister vessels, the  
Saxonia, Ivernia and Carinthia.  
The Sylvia sails on her  
maiden voyage to Quebec and  
Montreal June 5, 1957. She is  
the last of four sister ships made dur-  
ing the last four years for the  
Cunard Line's Atlantic run.

cized in the United States as well  
as Britain but said he holds no  
grudge.  
"I love everybody," he crooned  
into his microphone while shrieks,  
screams and wails from the audi-  
ence echoed over the house.

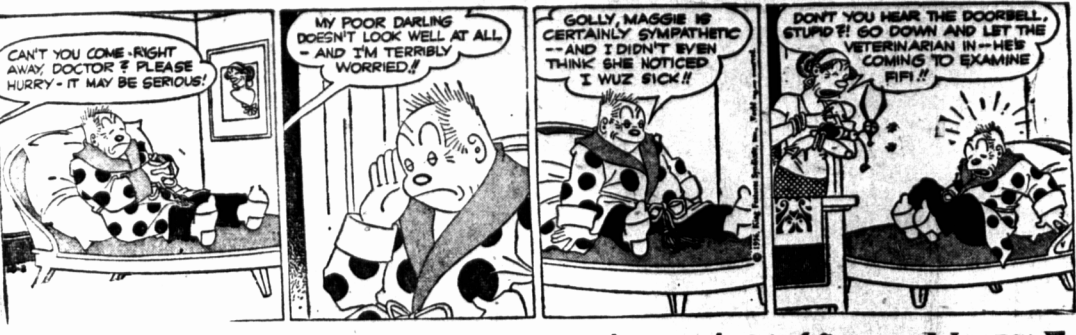

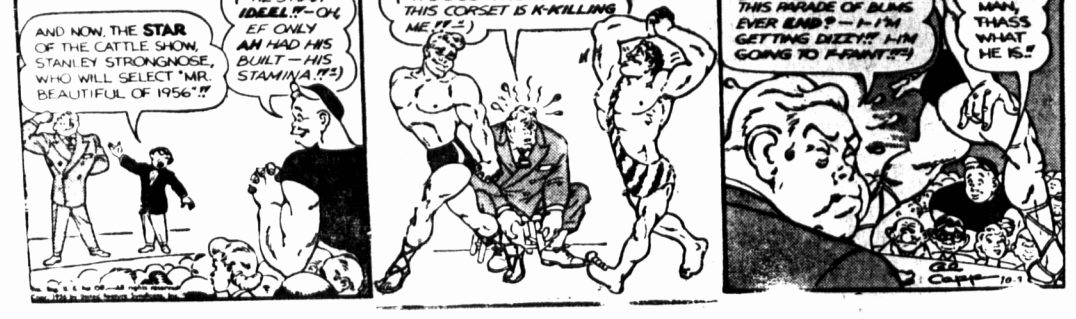

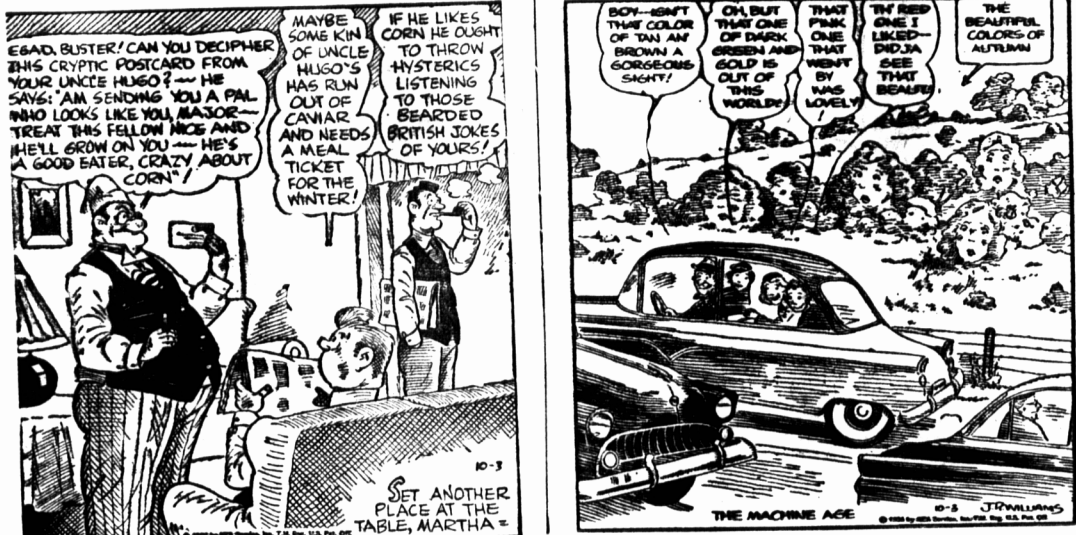

Choosing an opening lead is frequently a difficult proposition. The choice of the opening lead very often determines the destiny of a hand. Although our very best card players handle the dummy and the defense on nearly every hand just as though they had seen all 52 cards in advance, they frequently fail, even as you and I, when it comes to the opening lead. The most critical period in the play is the very first one.

Clues obtained during the bidding period can be very helpful. In today's hand there is an elegant message contained in the North-South bidding which West can intercept. If his ears are

sharply tuned, he can defeat the contract.

It may be observed that if West commences with the ace and another diamond, East can ruff, return a heart and get another ruff, the setting trick. We claim that West should anticipate that exactly that will happen.

Why? Because the bidding indicates East is likely to have at most one diamond. The two no-trump response stipulated a diamond stopper. The three diamond bid represented a biddable suit. Put the two together and you find that North-South diamonds are apt to be divided either 4-4 or 5-3. In either case, East has a singleton diamond.

After the ace of diamonds, West leads the nine of diamonds. East trumps. Which suit does he return to obtain another ruff? His partner may have either the ace of hearts or clubs. But it is not a matter of guesswork.

West led the nine of diamonds. It is a high diamond. It is a signal to return the higher ranking suit, as between hearts and clubs. This is an integral part of the suit directing or Becker convention. The heart return is followed by another diamond and South is out of business.

Had West held the ace of clubs instead of hearts, he would have returned the deuce of diamonds. This low card would have signified to East a request to return the low suit, clubs.

High—high; low—low.

Concerned Over Hayloft Office

TORONTO (CP)—Alderman Don Summerville said Saturday he is concerned about a private office, tucked away in the heart of west-end High Park.

The wood-ringed retreat, equipped with a \$3,000 flashing-light map and an electric kettle among other things, is used exclusively by George T. Bell, Toronto's parks commissioner, and his staff, Mr. Summerville says.

He said he plans to ask an explanation of the parks commissioner at city council's next meeting.

Mr. Summerville said the office, a converted hayloft, is furnished with polished tables and expensive drapes. It has large picture windows and a plush bathroom.

Said Mr. Summerville of the map, a technician glory depicting parks development:

"If any place, this should be in the city hall where the parks committee and council members could enjoy the full benefit of it."

Mr. Bell told reporters the office is used for staff meetings and for his own work away from the disturbances of his city hall office.

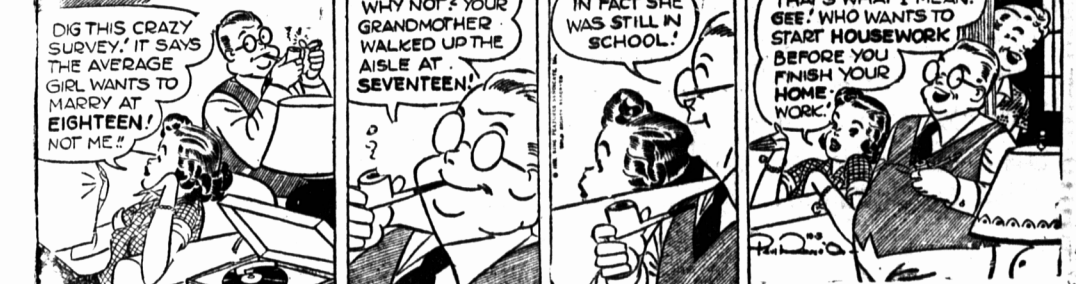
