Federal Loans To Island Farmers

Over 500 more loans under the Farm Improvement Loan Act were made to island farmers last year than in 1951, according to a report tabled in the House of Commons by Hon. D. C. Abbott, Minister of Finance.

Last year the number of loans made under the Act was 1,722 compared to 1,271 in 1951. The total amount borrowed last year was \$1,756,233 compared to the previous year's total of \$1,144,293. Since the inception of the Act in 1945 Prince Edward Island farmers have received 4,083 loans worth \$3,779,988.

A very cordial welcome was extended by Sterling Webster of the United Church of Y.P.U., who was responding to Mary Morrison of Trinity Y.P.U.

Reports on the year's work were made by the president, secretary, treasurer, and various committees.

While serving there he wrote letters back home in which he pointed out the advantages to be gained from the growing of seed potatoes here for sale to the Southern United States.

Famed As Holstein Breeder. His keen interest in the breeding of high quality cattle led eventually to the possession of one of the finest herds of Holsteins in Canada.

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He generally put in a full day attending to the business of his office and making plans for the future.

Recognition of his knowledge of the fur farming industry, then practically in its infancy, came with an appointment on the Commission of Conservation, Ottawa, in 1912.

For his achievements in cattle breeding he was awarded the Master Breeder's Shield by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, the first individual breeder to receive it.

Three Straight Victories. Politically he has consistently led his party to victory since he took over as Premier in 1943 when he then Premier, Thane A. Campbell, was appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

A firm believer in his native Province he did much to foster the development of the same increased Newfoundland trade, establishment of special cold storage facilities and the use of draggers to help increase the catch of fish.

The Department of Health and Welfare went through a period of tremendous growth with the accent on prevention of disease.

And last March the Legislature was presented with a balanced budget for only the second time in nearly half a century.

Lobster Cases Before Magistrate

In Magistrate's Court held at Montague yesterday before Joseph W. MacDonald, Magistrate for King's County, for violations of the lobster fishery regulations for P. E. I., sec. 12 s.s. (A): two residents of Murray Harbour were fined \$20 each and \$4 costs, two residents of Murray Harbour were fined \$10 each and \$4 costs.

For violation of the lobster fishery regulations for P. E. I., sec. 7 S.S. (B) relating to size limits: Two residents of Gaspereaux were fined \$25 each and \$4 costs. One resident of Launching was fined \$25 and \$5 costs. One resident of Murray Harbour was fined \$25 and \$4 costs.

Nine residents of Murray Harbour North were fined \$25 each and \$4 costs, and one resident of Murray Harbour North was fined \$25 and \$3 costs. One resident of Georgetown was fined \$35 and \$4 costs and one resident of Georgetown was fined \$25 and \$3 costs.

In all 29 cases were heard and all defendants pleaded guilty.
