Quebec Elections.

MONTREAL, Dec. 13.—The Conservatives have decided to contest the County of Nicolet. Joseph Beauchemin is likely to be chosen as their candidate. It is understood that Charles Langelier will have opposition in Bonaventure, Mr. Clapper-ton, of New Carlisle, a liberal, having decided, so it is stated, to run against Langelier.

Laurier's Hand in It.

ROME, Dec. 13.—It is reaffirmed here that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has asked the Vatican to establish a Nunciature to Canada, and Baron Charles Russell Lord Chief Justice of England came to Rome about the end of last month to repeat the request.

Chapleau Ready!

MONTREAL, Dec. 13.—A French speaking M. P., and two or three members of the legislature were on the train last night with Lieutenant Governor Chapleau, and according to one of the party the Lieutenant Governor distinctly stated that he was not going to continue in office, but was ready to hand over the keys of Spencer-wood as soon as his successor was appointed.

A Fallen Ministry.

PORT AU PRINCE, Dec. 13.—The entire ministry of Hayti has resigned.

Notes From the Capital.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13.—The revenue for the five months which ended the 30th Nov. shows a decrease of eighty thousand dollars. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has gone to St. Lin where his brother is reported to be dangerously ill.

The government will investigate the complaints of the laborers on the Crow's Nest Pass Railway construction.

The date of the meeting of parliament will not be determined until Hon. Mr. Fielding returns.

Death of Mrs. McKinley.

CANTON, Ohio, Dec. 13.—Mrs. McKinley the mother of President McKinley died at 2.30 a.m. yesterday.

The Great Bicycle Race.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—The great bicycle race closed at 10.15 last night with Miller leading by 67 miles. His score was 2093 miles and 40 laps, against the best previous record for 142 hours made last year by Hale. He gets \$1,500 for his week's work; Rice, \$800; Schinner, \$500; Hale, \$300; Waller, \$300; Pierce, \$200; Golden, \$150; Gennor, \$125; Esterman and Riviere, \$100 each and Elkess, \$5. All the riders who covered over 1350 miles will probably get \$50 each.

After the big race was finished, Miller rode an exhibition two miles with pace-makers in 5.03. The final scores were as follows, Miller, 2093 miles and 4 laps; Rice, 2025 and 5 laps; Schinner, 2000 miles and 7 laps; Hale, 1920 and 4 laps; Waller, 1383 and 1 lap; Pierce, 1828; Golden, 1778 miles; Gannon, 1769 miles and 6 laps; Esterman, 1753 miles and 7 laps; Elkess, 1660 and 7 laps; King, 1616 and 8 laps; Jules, 1503 miles and 5 laps; Blaroom, 1350 and 8 laps; Johnson, 1279 miles and 4 laps; Gray, 1229 miles; Riviere, 1746 miles and 7 laps; Moore, 1495 and 5 laps.

From what can be learned it is believed that the track was something like two hundred feet short to the mile.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Today the surveyors went over the course and it was officially announced that the riders had not travelled a full mile for every nine laps. Just how short each mile was has not yet been given out.

Death of a Conductor.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Dec. 13.—This morning, at 8 o'clock, Charles Thompson, of Middle Sackville, a special conductor on the I. C. R., was killed in the railway yard here. He was between two cars looking to the coupling and fell into a cattle guard his neck resting on the rail. One car passed over him nearly severing the head from the body. An inquest is now being held. He leaves a wife and two small children.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The text of the definitive treaty of peace between Turkey and Greece, which will be published today, contains about 2,000 words, including two protocols referring respectively to the commercial convention and consular immunities. The treaty amplifies the preliminary police terms, all the points of which have already been published.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—According to a despatch to the Daily Mail from Cairo, six hundred British troops will take part in the advance of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition in the Soudan, which was postponed after the capture of Berber last September, in order to avoid the hot season.

PARIS, Dec. 10.—The Temps, commenting today upon the settlement of the German Hayti trouble, says:

"President Sam and his colleagues imagined that the convenient and elastic Monroe doctrine would apply to their case. This limited calculation was wrong. The United States were not anxious to advertise or extend their solidarity of negro states. On the other hand, the last reproach which can be urged against the policy of Washington is not taking into account the relative strength of nations. America does not wish to embroil itself with Germany merely for the beaux yeux of the black republic."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—General J. W. Foster, in charge of the Behring Sea negotiations, has taken up the general subject of wider treaty relations with Canada, and today he was in close consultation with a delegation of prominent fish merchants from Gloucester, Mass. They were Messrs. Cunningham, Smith and Pugh, all interested in the fisheries off the coast of Newfoundland and neighboring waters. They gave to Mr. Foster a good deal of information as to what the Gloucester fishermen needed in the way of enlarged facilities should a new treaty be negotiated.

NEW YORK, December 11.—It was learned yesterday that one of the biggest robberies in the history of the New York post office occurred on November 9th. The amount is stated to be in the neighborhood of \$100,000, and was taken from registered letters in the railway mail service on that section of the Central railroad of New Jersey known as the New York, Sumerville and Easton branch. On November 9th, it is stated, two bags, containing \$30,000, were taken. How long the defalcations had gone on before that date has not yet been ascertained.

VIENNA, Dec. 11.—A great sensation has been caused here by the posting broadcast yesterday evening of red placards, even in the inner town and Hofburg, inscribed "No Ausgleich;" "Abolish the language ordinances;" and "German is the national language." The police tore the placards down.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11.—The health and police committee of the board of supervisors yesterday put a quietus upon prize fighting in this city for some time to come, by refusing any more permits for "pugilistic exhibitions." This disposes of the Griffin-Lavigne, Hawkins-Connelly, and the Smith-Kelly matches.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The Omar Khayam Club will give a dinner to Colonel John Hay, the American Ambassador, who pronounced an eloquent and aesthetic appreciation of the great Persian poet. The Chronicle, commenting upon the Ambassador's speech, describes it as a masterpiece of literary oratory delivered in faultless style. It adds that the United States have absurdly never, not excepting Mr. Lowell, been represented by a stronger, more charming, and more cultivated personality than Mr. Hay.
