A RUMPUS IN HALIFAX.

RESIGNATION OF MILITIA Officers.

General Gascoigne's Insult Resented

HALIFAX, Nov. 18.—At the inspection of the 66th Princess Louise Fusiliers, by Major General Gascoigne on Tuesday evening, the officer made statements in public regarding the battalion which the officers of the Fusiliers considered groundless and insulting. As a result, Colonel Humphrey and the officers have sent in their resignations. The changes made by General Gascoigne are considered outrageous in militia circles generally, and private citizens are sympathizing with the battalion. The assertion of General Gascoigne that two-thirds of the 66th, rank and file, are army reserve men drawing pay from two sources, is taken as a charge of fraud. The fact that not more than forty, at the outside, of the men who are enrolled in the 66th are army-reserve men, and that General Gascoigne was talking through his hat, does not help matters. The 66th officers were practically charged with fraud and publicly insulted in a most cold-blooded manner.

ALBANY, New York, Nov. 18.—The Right Rev. William Doane, Bishop of Albany, presided at the annual convention of clergymen and lay delegates of the Albany Episcopal diocese, which opened here yesterday. In his annual address the Bishop denounced the jingoism prevalent in the States and spoke strongly in favor of international arbitration.

A BRUSH IN THE MOUNTAINS

British Force Compelled to Retire.

Gallant Conduct of the Sikhs.

SIMLA, Nov. 18.—Two companies of Sikhs, holding the spur of the hill, were so fiercely assaulted yesterday that they had to call for reinforcements. Colonel Haughton with the Baknir Sikhs regiment rushed to their support. The whole force withdrew gradually fighting every step of the valley. Dusk had now set in and the enemy was crowding the British on all sides. Colonel Haughton determined to camp for the night and send companies to storm a couple of block houses from which the fire was annoying. The Sikhs drove out the enemy at the point of the bayonet. Six were killed and many were wounded during this charge. The wounded were then brought in under the enemy's increasing fire and the force finally reached head-quarters next morning without further casualties.

TARTE TAKES A LITTLE TRIP

Goes to See New York Harbor.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—Hon. Mr. Tarte and his chief Engineer, left here for New York to inspect the New York harbor works. Madame Tarte and daughter accompanied the minister. Sir Oliver Mowat left here for Toronto yesterday morning.

MONCTON, Nov. 18.—The Rev. P. Bradley, the priest resident at Cape Bauld, Westmoreland, died suddenly yesterday.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

VIENNA, Nov. 16.—The Greek bishop of Canea, island of Crete, has been notified by the Russian consul that the czar proposes to rebuild at his own cost the burned Christian quarter of Canea and to enlarge the Orthodox Greek church. His majesty has also granted a large sum of money for the relief of the poor of Canea.

St. PETERSBURG, Nov. 16.—All day long a fierce wind from the sea has driven the waters of the Neva up the stream and flooded the canals, suburban islands and outlying portions of the city. Several bridges have been swept away and the flood continues to rise, threatening to assume grave proportions. At frequent intervals cannon are fired at the fortress to keep the inhabitants alert.

CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Edward Fink, 20 years old, waved at his sweetheart a hand containing a bottle of carbolic acid. "Hurrah! I'm off," he shouted, and drank the contents. Fink stood opposite the home of Miss Nannie Peterson. She sat by the window watching her youthful lover, with whom she had quarrelled. She saw him raise the bottle to his lips, and heard his adieu. She saw him swallow the poison and fall to the ground. Then she rushed across the street, and knelt by his side until an ambulance came. Fink died an hour afterwards. The trouble started in a lovers quarrel Saturday night at a party.

St. JOHN'S Nfld., Nov. 16.—Governor Murray claims that he does not agree with Lord Aberdeen regarding appointments, and sanctioned a large number today, mostly defeated candidates. The Government resigned in the afternoon, and the Winter-Motine administration assumes control tomorrow morning. All appointments since the election will be cancelled. A Gazette Extraordinary tomorrow afternoon will announce that James Baird, Alex. Robinson, John B. Ayre, and E. Bowring will be appointed to the legislative council.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 16.—Attorney-General Cameron of the Manitoba government said the decision of the Pope as reported is to be regretted. It seems that the antagonism of the minority to the public schools system has apparently rather increased than diminished since the settlement and will probably be further increased than diminished by the decision. He considered it a retroactive step on the part of the Vatican. Mr. Cameron wants to know why the same rule has not been laid down for the province of Ontario.

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 19.—The Commercial Tribune this morning prints a story of a football game between two high school clubs of this city, those of Hughes high school and Walnut Hills high school, in which there was a riotous free fight. Each school had its high school banner. Some one set fire to Walnut Hill banner and held the blazing flag aloft; then followed a competition in burning of banners, and this diversion ripened into a contest with fists and clubs, in which the varieties of each school participated. At first it was chiefly in front of the grand stand, where it appeared so innocent that the police present did not interfere. Back of the grand stand, however, one player was laid out unconscious for several minutes from a blow on the head by a fence board, another got a broken nose from a brickbat, while a great many came off with black eyes and bruised heads. In the fistuffs before the game Hughes won, but in the game Walnut Hill was victor by ten to nothing.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—The Behring sea meeting in which representatives of Great Britain, Canada and the United States have participated, came to a close tonight. The representatives of the respective governments reached an understanding by which they hope at a later day to effect a final decision.

TORONTO, November 16.—A movement, with Sir Frank Smith at its head, has been started here having for its object the presentation to Sir George Kirkpatrick, of some tangible proof of the popularity enjoyed throughout the province by the retiring Leut.-Governor and his wife.

WASHINGTON, November 16.—Secretary Gage has requested the secretary of the interior to instruct the Alaskan officials to gather about 600 head of reindeer from the government herds for the use of the expedition for the relief of the ice-bound whalers in the Arctic. The herd, which will be killed for food if needed, will be driven overland, and it is the confident expectation, will reach the imprisoned whalers before the middle of February. The route over which the herd will be driven is said to abound in moss, upon which the reindeer will feed, and it is agreed that the relief scheme is feasible and will be attended with little danger. The eight vessels now ice-bound have a combined complement of 265 men.
