Sir Charles' Address.

A FULL report of the address delivered yesterday by Sir Charles Tupper is published in this issue of THE EXAMINER.

The Patriot says Sir Charles "stated that the loss of the West Indian trade had not been caused by the present policy of the Government."

The Treaty with Spain, by which trade with the West Indies will be promoted, is not, as the Patriot assumes, a partisan matter.

Sir Charles made not one partisan remark, said not one partisan word. If the absolute undoubted facts which he presented clash with the statements and views of Mr. Davies and Mr. Laird, so much the worse for those gentlemen.

An attempt was made to get up a cheer for Sir Charles when he was done, but the response was feeble indeed.

The thousands who heard the ringing enthusiastic cheers for Sir Charles will now know what dependence to place upon the statements of the Patriot.

The Hall last Night.

THE Market Hall was crowded to excess last night. A large number of people who had bought and paid for tickets were unable to obtain admission, while the greater portion of those who did manage to obtain an entrance were unable to get seats, and were compelled to stand and run the risk of being crushed and seriously injured.

The cause of all this was owing to the sale of nearly two thousand tickets, while there was not accommodation for more than nine hundred ticket holders.

Tickets were peddled about Charlotte-town and Summerside, and innocent people were induced to purchase them upon the representation that a limited number only had been issued, and that ample and reasonable accommodation would be provided to all to whom tickets were sold.

The Salvation Army officers are responsible for this breach of faith so successfully practised on the public. They should explain their conduct, and inform the deceived public of the number of tickets issued and sold.

We strongly incline to the opinion that this conduct is fraudulent. If not fraudulent, it is difficult to define what it amounts to. It certainly was not honest to knowingly sell more tickets than the Hall could accommodate.

We take it to be clear that every ticket holder had not only a legal right to enter the Hall and hear and see what was said and done, but also the right to reasonable accommodation and safety while there.

A GREAT FUTURE BEFORE CANADA.

Its People Should Stand by their Rights, and be True to Themselves.

(Reported for Examiner by Mr. Ozonham.)

SIR CHARLES TUPPER said:—Mr. Mayor and Gentlemen, I thank you very much for the kind and pleasing address with which you have welcomed me to Prince Edward Island on the present occasion.

WITH THE UTMOST PLEASURE, the productions of the remarkably fertile soil, for which this Island is noted, such as its corn, fruit, etc. I can only say that I trust the members of the Local Government and the Exhibition Commissioners will do me the great pleasure of sending to me, in London, in the first steamer that leaves Halifax, the best specimens of grain, vegetables and fruits which I have seen to-day.

A DEEP FEELING HAS TAKEN POSSESSION of the minds of the people of Great Britain that it would be a misfortune to the Mother Country and to the Colonies if that Exhibition were not to assume a permanent form.

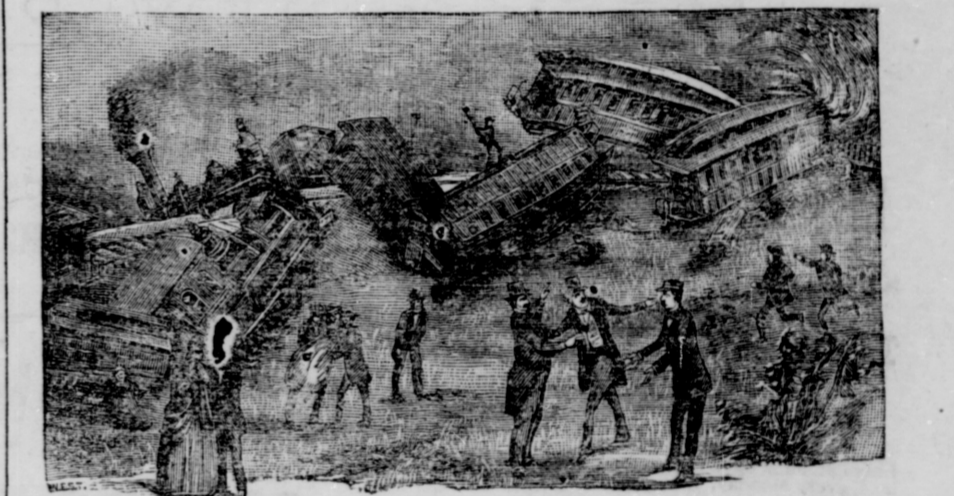
