RELIGIOUS SERVICES

ST. JAMES KIRK

In observance of Good Friday as a Holy Day, members, adherents and friends of St. James Presbyterian Church, assembled for worship yesterday morning.

The minister, the Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, D. D. preached an eloquent sermon, in his own inimitable style.

Dr. Legate took as his text I. Corinthians XIX, verse 3, "Christ died for our sins," and set forth most pointedly the necessity for giving the Cross first place in our religion.

The service throughout was inspiring, the congregational singing appropriate, Gospel hymns lending to the impressiveness of the worship.

The Choir also sang as an offering number a selection from the Book of Praise.

An extended context of the minister's sermon appears in today's issue.

BAPTIST CHURCH

Service was held at the Baptist Church Friday evening in commemoration of Christ's sacrifice on the cross for the sins of the world. There was a large and interested congregation. Rev. Mr. Bishop spoke from Matthew 20:18 "because we go up to Jerusalem and the Son of man shall be betrayed."

Jesus pronounced His Crucifixion, which prophecy was fulfilled, the religion has its aspect of denial and sacrifice. Rev. Mr. Bishop pointed out. The choir led in congregational singing.

ZION CHURCH

A congregation that taxed the church hall to capacity met in Zion Hall last evening for preparatory services. The service was the last of a week of special meetings which have been enjoyed by large congregations each night. Rev. G. C. Webster, minister of the congregation, spoke on the subject "The Glory of the Cross," and took as his text John 13, verses 31-32, "Therefore, when he was gone out, Jesus said, now is the Son of man glorified, and God is glorified in him. If God be glorified in him, God shall also glorify him in himself and shall straightway glorify him."

In developing the theme the minister spoke of the eventful night preceding the crucifixion and then showed how the cross, originally looked upon as an emblem of suffering, ignominy and shame, became the symbol of power, glory and victory. Paradoxical as it may seem, Rev. Mr. Webster said, the cross became Christ's glorification in a three-fold sense. The Son of man was glorified in the Cross, God was glorified in the Son of man and finally the Son was glorified in the Father. Christ became obedient unto death, even the death of the Cross wherefore God hath highly exalted and given Him a name that is above every name. Christ, therefore, by His death, glorified God and Himself and brought eternal glory to all obedient in Him.

At the close of the service the session had the great joy of extending the right hand of fellowship to 19 new members, all of whom were received on profession of their faith in Jesus Christ. Another is to be received on Sabbath morning, when the congregation will sit down at the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

HOLY REDEEMER CHURCH

Holy Week services Thursday and yesterday at Holy Redeemer Church were largely attended.

On Maundy Thursday, one Mass with Gloria and Procession to the Sepulchre took place.

Holy Hour in the evening was conducted by Very Rev. H. I. Fleming, C.S.S.R. An eloquent and appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. R. H. L. Baines, C.S.S.R.

On Good Friday morning ceremonies consisted of the Passion of St. John, the Adoration of the Cross, and Mass of the Presanctified.

From noon till three o'clock the Devotion of the Three Hours in Honor of the Crucifixion was held. During the devotion, in remembrance of the three hours Our Lord remained upon the Cross, sermons on Our Lord's great sufferings on the Cross and on the Seven Words He uttered were preached by Very Rev. H. I. Fleming, C.S.S.R., Rev. Charles O'Hara, C.S.S.R., Rev. R. H. L. Baines, C.S.S.R., and Rev. R. H. L. Baines, C.S.S.R. Special prayers were also recited and hymns, specially arranged for this service were rendered by the full choir. The congregation was blessed with the recitation of the True Cross. Veneration of the Cross took place at the conclusion of the service. Way of the Cross was held in the evening.

Today, Holy Saturday, the ceremonies performed are: the Blessing of the Paschal Candle, Prophecies, Blessing of the Font, and Mass with alleluia.

ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL

All the Good Friday services at St. Peter's Cathedral yesterday were largely attended.

The services were as follows: at 10.15 a. m. Matins and Litany and at 11 a. m. reproaches and alter service; at 2.30 p. m. there was a service of devotion; at 7.30 Evening, Rev. Canon Banks gave an address at the 11, 2.30 and 7.30 services. Each sermon was based on the crucifixion.

The high altar was stripped of all its furnishings for the services throughout the day and will remain so until the first Evensong of Easter, which will be tonight at 7.30.

ST. DUNSTAN'S BASILICA

Special Good Friday services at St. Dunstan's Basilica were very largely attended.

At 9 o'clock yesterday morning the Mass of the Presanctified was celebrated by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan. He was assisted by Rev. Father McMahon as High Priest, Rev. Father McKenna as deacon, Rev. Father McDonald as sub-deacon.

The third number was a semi-chorus and a chorus of men's voices "And They That Passed By" then Mr. Roy Smallman was heard in a baritone solo "My God! My God! Why Hast Thou Forsaken Me?" Part two was also opened with a chorus "O Saviour of the World" followed by a baritone recitative by Mr. Smallman, "And it was about the sixth hour." The final soprano solo and chorus was "Lord of my heart." Miss Sterns again taking the solo part and in both instances her rendition was faultless.

At the Wednesday evening service more than 60 were received into the membership of the church about equally divided between those on certificates from other churches and those on profession of faith. The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be observed in connection with the morning service tomorrow, Easter Sunday. A large attendance is anticipated.
