## Pickle Your Own Peaches In This Quick, Easy Way

As the fresh fruit passed by a grocery store, certainly all eyes turned to it. I chuckled the first time I saw it. I had never seen it before in Maine, so I must be in a new world.

The waitress on the relatives' table said:

"The waitress of course, Madame. Crisp celery and fenel, creamed cottage cheese in big tarts and perfect pickled peaches."

Quick pickled peaches. First wash a syrup.

For 4 lbs. of peaches, mix 1 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup vinegar, 4 sticks cinnamon, 1 tsp. whole allspice and 1 tsp. whole cloves. Cook until clear and the sugar is dissolved.

Wash peaches and peel, but do not cut. Put in the syrup and let stand for 24 hours. Pack the peaches into boiling water.

Quickly fill the jars full with boiling water and seal with waxed jar tops.

Place the peaches that place the jars on the side for 4 days. Turn jars daily.

Sunday dinner: Relish try of turkey, cottage cheese and baked peaches, baked stuffed chicken, potatoes, rice, creamed onions, time sliced from raspberry, top with coffee or tea, milk. All measurements are level, recipes dependent on size of family.
