## Anslow Inquest Ended After 2-Week Recess

Inquest into the death of Lydia (Mrs. Richard) Anslow of Summerside resumed last night at adjournment two weeks ago to hear the evidence of Andre Maurice Joseph Pronovost, 19, a member of the RCMP stationed in Summerside.

At the previous sitting Pronovost had been absent on sick leave following treatment for injuries he sustained in the same accident in which Mrs. Anslow was killed.

When Pronovost had been called and finished describing the events he remembered on the night in question, coroner Dr. Allan MacMillan recalled a previous witness, Judy Blanche Hancock, to determine what he called "conflict" in the evidence given by Pronovost with her own.

After nearly an hour's deliberation the coroner's jury decided that Mrs. Anslow had died of injuries received in an automobile accident which occurred on the South Melville Road just off the Trans Canada Highway between Charlotte-town and Borden on the morning of Aug. 12, 1964.

There were four people in the car at the time of the accident—Mrs. Anslow, Pronovost, Miss Hancock and the driver, Ivan Carigan. The four had driven to Charlottetown earlier in the evening and were returning to Summerside when the accident happened. Apparently the car went out of control on a corner and smashed into a guardrail.

**JURY DIVIDED**  
According to the foreman's report to the coroner, the jury members were divided as to whether or not negligence had been committed in the accident. Recommendations were made that warning signs should be posted at the corner where the accident happened and that the road should be properly marked with a white line.

It is not known at present whether or not the Attorney General's department will press charges in the case.

Named to the coroner's jury for the inquest were Ralph Kenneth MacLeod, foreman; Allan Scott MacPherson; Vernon Webster Penny; Roy Theodore MacArthur; Paul Eugene Flood; Irving James

MacLeod, all of Charlottetown; and George Gordon Gillespie of Cornwall.

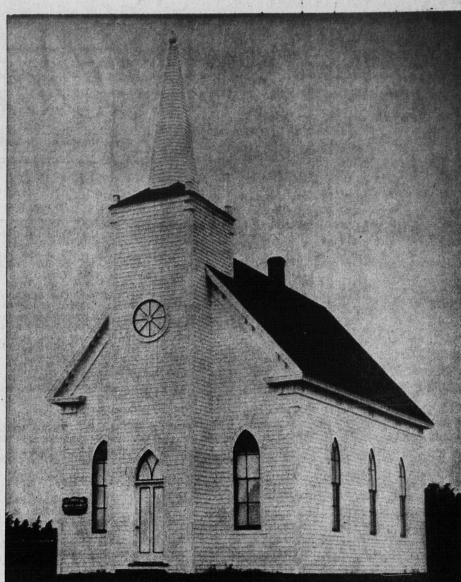
The championships are sponsored by Pepsi-Cola Canada Ltd. and conducted by the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

## Resolution Praises CBC For Removal Of Program

A resolution of "hearts" commendation to the CBC for its action in discontinuing the program "Quest" was passed unanimously by the Catholic Women's League of Canada yesterday at the organization's annual convention in Charlottetown.

The same resolution expressed concern for "programs which are offensive to moral principles and indecent for public viewing" while commending the CBC for "such fine programs as 'Heritage', 'Cameo' as offensive and indecent were 'For The Want of Better Things To Do', 'Crawling Arnold' shown on 'Rums', and 'A Very Close Family' and 'Still Life' on 'Festival'."

CWL members were also unanimous in passing a resolution to be presented to the government of Canada requesting that the minimum age for purchase of firearms be set at 16 years of age.

**TAX INCREASE**  
The League will ask the federal Government to increase the income tax exemption for single persons to \$1,500 and for married persons to \$300 due to the rise in the cost of living.

A third resolution to be presented to the Canadian Government will request that body to avoid inequities by revisiting and annulling plans for widows and dependents, and collect surrogation duties annually during the inability of the widow dependent.

Other resolutions passed asked the CWL members to take a more active interest in the Population of the Faith Society, commend provincial education

ministers on their efforts toward a national union school curriculum, study child welfare acts and their application, and stimulate the growth of vocations.

Mrs. James MacDonald, Mon-

tréal, national social action and social welfare convenor stated that during the past year 481 foster homes had been found for 877 children, and 284 adoptive homes for 305 children.

A plea for more subscriptions to the Canadian League, the CWL magazine, was put forth by national magazine convenor, Mrs. A.H. Cooban, Toronto. Only 20,898 members out of the CWL total membership of approximately 150,000 subscribe to the magazine, she estimated.

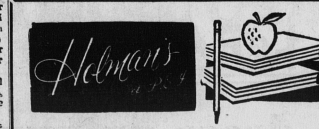

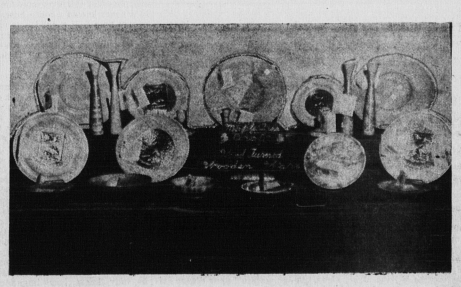


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
