RCAF Publication Looks At Taxes

SUMMERSIDE — "The Albatross" is a monthly publication by personnel of RCAF Station Summerside. It takes an editorial look in its January edition published yesterday, at the factors relating to recent concern among RCAF residents of Hillcrest, in regard to Summerside taxes.

The editorial, while taking the stand that both service and civilians should be concerned with the proposal for a study of possible tax reform, stated emphatically that tax arrears "are a legal debt, and as such must be paid".

It notes that the trouble appears to result from two basic problems. First, the subject of tax arrears, and secondly, the matter of what taxes should be levied in the future.

Referring to overdue taxes owing to the town by both civilians and air force personnel, the editorial suggests that if this amount could be substantially reduced, "a climate would be created in which the whole question of tax reform could be discussed".

The editorial expressed strong opposition to proposals that had been made in favour of a boycott of town merchants in order to force some sort of tax concession from the town council.

It said that such tactics would not be ethical or even fair to the merchants, and said this was not an idea that could be defended on the grounds that the end justified the means.

On the matter of tax returns, the editorial states that the quarter is not with the legality of present town taxes, but with the fairness of the tax structure itself.

It said there were other means available, and measures are being taken to ease the situation.
