The Dismissal of the City Surveyor To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—I agree with you that the calling together the City Council for the above purpose was, to say the least, a strange proceeding. I disagree with you that there was no good reason for appointing a new incumbent. I agree with you that he is a diligent, energetic official, but, perhaps, I disagree with you, in saying he is too energetic. I agree with you that he has made some improvements in the streets—some parts—in others he left them worse than he found them. The removal of pumps from the centre of streets to the sides is an improvement. To poison a well as soon as it is dug is a mad act. I allude to the well on Great George street opposite the door of R. Heartz. The old well in the centre of the street is filled up. A new one is dug at the corner of St. Patrick's School ground, then the street is well built up with ashes, a gutter is dug, the water, the drainings of the street, as it is on the dead level, can run neither north or south. I had an idea that the ashes were got from the foundry or the Gas Works. I am told they were got from back yards, and if so, I need say no more as to the quality of the water in the well. If the Surveyor acts under the orders of the Street Committee they should be dismissed, also, for no man with two grains of gumption above an ass would perform such a piece of sanitary engineering as that.

The Phoenix Park Murder. DUBLIN, Feb. 12. On Saturday, at the trial in Kilmainham Court of Joseph Brady, Timothy Kelly, Lawrence Hanlan, John Dwyer and others, for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, Michael Kavanagh, the carman, was placed on the witness stand. He testified that he drove the prisoners, Brady, Kelly, and others to and from the scene of the assassination in Phoenix Park; that they met Fitzharris on the way, and that four others were near by when Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke were murdered. He saw them stabbed by the assassins. The plot was only laid for Under Secretary Burke. The prisoners on hearing the evidence of Kavanagh, became very much agitated. They have lost all the courage which they previously appeared to possess. Kavanagh's evidence could not be shaken by the prisoners' Consuls.

United Ireland Libel Suit. DUBLIN, Feb. 12. The trial of Mr. O'Brien, Editor of United Ireland, for libel was concluded on Saturday. The jury disagreed.

The Cimbrina Disaster. HAMBURG, Feb. 12. The investigation into the cause of the Cimbrina disaster is still proceeding. On Saturday a witness, who saw the accident from the Sultan testified that he saw the Cimbrina sink, and that the Sultan could not then account for her own damage.

To Siberia. ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 12. Three directors of the St. Petersburg Credit Society, have been sentenced to exile in the mines of Siberia for fraud.

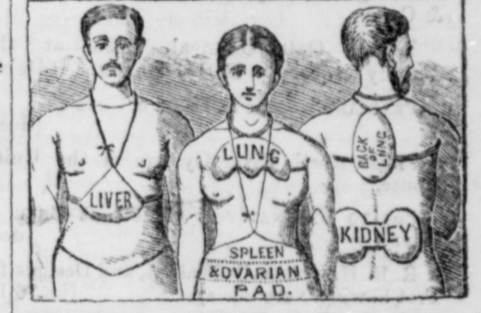
