Actor-Authors Seeking Best-Seller Rewards

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The woods are full of actor-authors these days as book publishers seek the gold already discovered with best sellers by Lillian Roth, Pat Boone, Art Linkletter and others. The volumes multiply. They range from the sensational to the inspirational. Some are fairly intriguing. Some should never have been written. Nearly all have the same sound—the tinkling of ego orchestrated by a literary aide. The ghost is always present, either sharing billing on the dust jacket or lurking in the misty background. Some of those now in the bookstores: The Autobiography of Cecil B. DeMille is a good view of the public face of the great movie maker. It is written with the same outward dignity with which C. B. spoke, yet he is able to tell stories on himself. Such as the wartime Oscar dinner when he introduced the ambassador from China as "his excellency, the Japanese ambassador." The book gives an interesting account of the film industry's beginnings and workings of the DeMille machine. If the man himself fails to emerge, perhaps it is because he was more devoted to legend than reality.

Financial Aid Is Said Needed In Private, Parochial Schools

WINNIPEG (CP)—A return of government financial aid for Manitoba's private and parochial schools and a general toughening of educational standards are among the main recommendations in the report of a provincial royal commission on education, released last week. In unanimously recommending aid for separate schools, the five-member commission said "various applications of the principles of democracy by which we try to live requires that whenever possible the majority be tolerant enough to provide for significant minorities any kind of education they want for their children." A system of separate schools for Protestant and Roman Catholic children was abolished in Manitoba in 1890 when the provincial government set up a public school system with no religious distinctions. Twenty Scouts Are Invested

OTTAWA (CP) — Governor-General Vanier Thursday invested 20 scouts and scoutmasters with the highest awards in scouting at a solemn ceremony in Government House. Three western Canada youths headed the list, receiving the Cornwall Scout Badge, highest award. They were Patrol Leader Frederick John Vance of Kemano, B.C.; Patrol Leader Andrew Mark Stevens of Lloydminster, Alta., and Scout Michael William Byng-Hall of Vancouver. Among eight recipients of the Silver Cross were five scoutmasters from Springhill, N.S., who were in the first rescue group to enter Springhill's No. 2 colliery in October after 174 miners were trapped in a cave-in. They are Wilfred Leland Brown, 46, James Booth, 44, Kenneth Bigelow, 41, Joseph Melanson, 42, and Stanley Pashkoski, 32. Three scoutmasters from Hastings, Ont., received awards for heroic action in rescuing a group of people from an overturned boat in dangerous waters. Philip G. Day and William L. White received silver crosses. Robert H. Scriver received the gilt cross.
