

Braves Run Streak To Five Beat Chicago; Brooks Win

Mays Hits Home Run As Giants Win; Tigers Lose

Milwaukee's front-running Braves ran their winning streak to five in a row Monday night when they walloped Philadelphia Phillies 5-1 for their fifth victory in six starts.

Willie Mays' third home run in the season, with two mates aboard in the third inning accounted for all New York's runs in the Giants' 3-1 triumph over Pittsburgh Pirates.

Baltimore and Kansas City, a pair of weak sisters in the American League, moved up into the .500 class and a third place tie by winning their games. The Orioles defeated Boston Red Sox 7-5 for their third victory in six games and Athletics matched their record with an 11-7 triumph over Detroit.

PACED BY HOMERS
Home runs by Joe Adcock and Henry Aaron paced the Braves to their easiest victory of the season as they grabbed a 9-1 lead in the first three innings and coasted the rest of the way. Bob Buhl picked up his first triumph of the campaign although he needed help from Gene Conley, who hurled the last two innings.

Another superb relief job by Clem Labine, his third of the young season, helped the Dodgers successfully open their eight-game home season in Jersey City. Labine relieved Roger Craig with runners on second and third and one out in the eighth inning. The ace fireman retired Ed Bouchee on a tap in front of the plate and ended the threat by getting Harry Anderson to pop to shortstop.

Yvon Durelle Wins Decision

NEW YORK (AP)—Canada's Yvon Durelle came up from the canvass in the first round Monday night and won a 10th round decision over Brooklyn's Angelo DeFendis in the featured event of a boxing bout at St. Nicholas Arena.

The Canadian light heavyweight champ made the 4-1 odds against him look silly by outdueling the Brooklyn brawler for the split decision. Durelle weighed 174 1/2 for the televised fight-DeFendis 173.

Referee Harry Ebbs voted for Durelle, 34-1 while Judge Tony Castellano scored for the Canadian on a points basis. He called the fight even in rounds 5-5, but had Durelle ahead in rounds 8-6. Judge Al Singer called it a draw, four rounds and five points for each. He called two rounds even. The Associated Press card had Durelle in front, 84-1.

SNAPPED KNEE
The loss snapped a six fight victory streak for DeFendis. Each scored a knockdown in the exciting television scrap. The 27-year-old Canadian fishing fleet owner from Base St. Ann, N.B., earned the nod by his more aggressive tactics.

Comments On Drug For Diabetes

MONTREAL (CP)—Dr. Leonard Mitchell, research director for a drug manufacturing firm, said Monday that diabetes should not become unduly hopeful that the recently announced new drug for treatment of diabetes by mouth will free them from insulin injections.

Dr. Mitchell's statement was released by Frank W. Horner, Ltd., Canadian manufacturer of the new drug. It was first developed in Germany. Its official name is tolbutamide, but is available in Canada under different trade names. The drug can be obtained only with a doctor's prescription.

One advantage of the drug is that it is taken orally. It will be more expensive than insulin, which must be injected under the skin since it is destroyed in the stomach and intestines if swallowed.

NHL Players' Ass'n Wants Improvement In Pension Plan

TORONTO (CP)—The National Hockey League Players' Association said in a statement that it is requesting an "improvement in the pension plan and participation in proceeds from television" of games.

The association held its first meeting since its formation last Feb. 11. "All activity of the association was held in abeyance until the end of the season so as not to interfere in any way with the primary purpose of winning hockey games," President Ted Lindsay of Detroit Red Wings said.

Lindsay read a brief prepared statement saying there had been "considerable discussion" at Monday's meeting of association officers about suggesting a change of date of the annual all-star game to a "convenient date in December."

N.W. REPRESENTATIVE
Asked for his comments about the players' statement — and Thomson — Leaf president Con Smythe said his players will have to find someone else to represent them, since "Thomson is no longer our player."

"He was waived out of the league at the end of the season and his contract was transferred to Rochester," (of the American Hockey League) Smythe said.

The baby Habs have captured the hearts of Ottawa hockey lovers in their first year of operation since being moved from Montreal by the National Hockey League Canadiens' organization.

Coach Sammy Pollock has a well-balanced, speedy club to toss at the Western Canada champions in an attempt to bring Canada's capital its initial Memorial Cup.

DETROIT WINGS AND HABS DOMINATE ALL-STAR TEAM
MONTREAL (CP)—Four members of Detroit Red Wings and two of Montreal Canadiens fill all the positions on the 1957 National Hockey League first all-star team, announced Monday by the league.

The Red Wings, winner of the league title, made such a clean-up for the first time there wasn't a Detroit on the second all-star aggregation. The distribution for the second team showed two Canadiens, two Boston Bruins and one player each from the New York Rangers and Chicago Black Hawks. No member of Toronto

SPORTS WRITERS VOTED
The voting was done by sports writers, broadcasters and telecasters in the six NHL cities and was weighted to give each city equal strength. Points were awarded on

the basis of five for a first choice, three for second and one for third. The selectors voted after each half of the season. The points shown are the combined totals.

Hall supplanted Terry Sawchuk, Boston goalie who was leading after the first half but became ill and left his team. Plante, first team goalie a year ago, dropped back to the second team.

Harvey, an outstanding player for the Stanley Cup champions, was by far the top choice for defence position. Red Kelly made the next spot comfortably. Both led after the first half. Gadsby was also a mid-season choice for the second team but Flaman supplanted teammate Doug Mohns, a choice at New Year's.

BELIVEAU LOST GROUND
Beliveau lost ground slightly in the second half but was still well voted otherwise was scattered. Litzzenberger, newcomer to an all-star team, made the second team, maintaining his mid-season selection.

Howe, whose 176 points were closest to the possible 180, regained the first-team right wing spot he lost to Richard the last two seasons. Lindsay, repeater this year along with Harvey, Kelly and Beliveau, was heavy choice for left wing. Chevrefils, making an all-star spot for the first time, supplanted Dickie Moore of Montreal, the mid-season leader for left wing on the second team.

Regals lead the best-of-seven WHL final 2-0 over New Westminster Royals. If they win, they play the Quebec Hockey League champions for the Edinburgh Trophy.

Dissolution Of Boxing Asked

NEW YORK (AP)—The U.S. government Monday proposed the dissolution of the International Boxing Club and its various branches and the complete separation of Madison Square Garden and other arenas from boxing promotion in its anti-monopoly fight against the principal organizations promoting championship fights.

These proposals were contained in a decree filed with federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan, who ruled last month that the IBC was guilty of monopolizing championship boxing bouts.

The IBC and Madison Square Garden, in a similar proposed decree for a final judgment on the case, offered to give up all exclusive contracts with boxers and to limit its activities in promoting championship fights to two title bouts a year.

HEARING MAY 30
A hearing on the two proposals has been set for May 30, after which Judge Ryan will hand down his final judgment.

Judge Ryan's ruling March 8 resulted from a nine-day trial last spring, during which the government contended that the IBC of New York, the IBC of Illinois, James D. Norris and Arthur M. Wirtz, the presidents of those organizations, and the Madison Square Garden Corporation had gained control of championship boxing bouts during a period from June 1, 1949, to May 16, 1953, and that this constituted unreasonable restraint of trade.

The ruling covered only championship bouts and did not include the weekly bouts which are televised and broadcast nationally. In his 59-page decision, Judge Ryan asked the IBC and the government to file proposed decrees with him.

SEVEN STEPS
The government's proposal calls for these steps toward wiping out the promotional combination:

1. That the IBC of New York and Illinois be ordered to "take appropriate steps" toward dissolution.

2. That Norris and Wirtz be ordered to take appropriate steps toward the dissolution of the IBC in Michigan and Missouri.

3. That Norris and Wirtz be ordered to sell within six months all stock they own or control in the Madison Square Garden Corporation.

4. That Norris and Wirtz resign within 30 days as officers or directors of the Madison Square Garden Corporation.

5. That the garden corporation be restrained from promoting or having an interest in the promotion of world championship contests as long as it controls the garden as an arena.

6. That Norris and Wirtz be enjoined from promoting championship bouts as long as either has a financial interest in the Chicago

Stadium, Detroit Olympia or St. Louis Arena.

7. That the defendants be enjoined from enforcing contracts for the exclusive services of boxers or contracts that would prevent an arena owner or operator from leasing the arena to other persons for promoting boxing.

In their counter-proposal, the defendants agree to an injunction against exclusive contracts with boxers, with an exception that a contract for a single championship contest could include the provision for a return bout within a year.

They also offer to limit the activities of the Madison Square Garden Corporation and of Norris and Wirtz to promoting not more than two championship fights a year for each of a period of five years; to do away with exclusive contracts with arenas and TV and radio outlets and to curtail sharply the scope of the IBC. This would permit a total of four title fights for both outfits.

All IBC proposals cover only championship bouts and do not include the twice-weekly televised programs.

The government's complaint said that during the period involved, the IBC had participated in the promotion of 36 of 44 championship bouts—about 80 per cent of those held in the U.S.
