

# Canadian Immigration Policy Shows Some Major Changes

OTTAWA (CP) — Major changes in immigration policy announced Friday in the white paper on immigration to Canada.

The white paper, announced by the Minister of Immigration, Mr. Marchand, will relax regulations on the sponsorship of immigrants by relatives in Canada and remove all discrimination on grounds of ethnic or religious origin.

As for immigrants without legal status, Mr. Marchand said the situation has become alarming and needs an immediate solution. It was possible for criminals and other undesirable to move to Canada without being detected by authorities.

This situation amounts to a wholesale circumvention of our normal systems of immigrant selection and control," he said.

Officials predicted that the net effect of all changes will be to maintain immigration at the present level, but to apply uniform standards to immigrants from all countries.

This is expected to stimulate immigration from Asia and Communist countries that do not restrict emigration, such as Poland and Yugoslavia.

# U.S. Soldiers Trap Viet Cong

QUAN LOI, South Viet Nam (Reuters) — Hundreds of American soldiers snapped shut a trap on the elusive Viet Cong near here Sunday. A small contingent of guerrillas fought a desperate rear-guard action to escape.

While their comrades retreated, fewer than 50 Viet Cong pinned down a U.S. platoon of the 1st Infantry Division.

The guerrillas fired machine-gun bursts and dashed between dense bamboo thickets to new positions.

Streams of bullets scythed down small trees and bushes as the Americans tried to inch forward. At least 185 Viet Cong and north Vietnamese dead were counted, U.S. sources said.

After two hours U.S. artillery and planes pounded the way open for the Americans to push through and later reach what they believed was the base camp of a Viet Cong regiment.

The U.S. "reverse ambush" was set Saturday by a column of 50 U.S. tanks and armored cars, which drove up a jungle road 50 miles north of Saigon and 15 miles from Cambodia as bait for the guerrillas.

BOMB DEPOSITS  
In the air war, waves of U.S. jet fighters—bombers—hammered away Sunday at lines of communications and oil storage depots in North Viet Nam.

A U.S. spokesman said one air force F-4C Phantom was shot down near the southern city of Dong Hoi. Its two crew members bailed out over the South China Sea and were picked up by a U.S. warplane.

He said that on Saturday navy A-6 Intruder jets from the carrier Constellation hit an oil depot 32 miles north of Vinh, another coastal city.

In the ground action, more than 2,000 Viet Cong took the bait by ambushing the column, a U.S. spokesman said.

By prearranged plan, waiting U.S. infantry and tanks were rushed up to try to catch the guerrillas in the open. Planes swooped down to strafe the Viet Cong.

American casualties were said to be light. Four armored cars of the "bait column" were destroyed by recoilless rifle shells.

Gen. William E. DePuy, commanding the 1st Infantry Division, said the Viet Cong regiment was the 272nd, well-armed with recoilless rifles and Chinese shoulder-mounted anti-tank guns and automatic weapons.

### Tourists Will Pan Own Gold

GAYS RIVER, N.S. (CP) — Tourists will be able to pan their own gold in Nova Scotia this summer.

McLean Brook, near the site of one of the province's oldest mines which has recently been re-opened, is the place, 30 miles north of Halifax.

For a \$2 fee, tourists will be able to pan for gold in the brook under the guidance of U.S. experienced prospectors. They get one share in the mining company for their fee and can take home any gold they find.

"I don't think they can miss getting some gold in each pan," said Jack Chapman, a director of the mine.

Gays River Mine has been reopened after a lapse of 85 years. It was first dug in 1882. The rock face has not yet been reached because rubble is still being dug out, but it is planned that visitors eventually may visit the shaft to see nuggets of gold on the face—if they're there.

Reopening old mines can be a paying proposition these days because old mining methods often failed to extract all the gold from the rock. The long-term prospects for the Gays River Mine are not known but the promoters hope to find placer deposits near the surface as well.

### Chinese Minister Stripped Of Posts

PEKING (Reuters)—Li Ting-ji, Communist China's minister of culture has been stripped of one of his top party posts. He is the second-highest leader to be clipped of power in the cultural-purge procedure, reportedly less here.

The minister, a vice-premier and alternate member of the policy-making politburo, ranked about 29th in the Communist party hierarchy. He was dismissed as head of the central committee's propaganda department.

The drive against officials and intellectuals has been particularly severe on propagandists.

As in the case of Peking Mayor Peng Chen, dismissed as head of the Peking Communist party last month, the downfall of Li was made known obliquely and without direct mention of his name.

The New China news agency, in a long report Sunday on a reception given in connection with an Afro-Asian writers' meeting here, listed another man, Tao Chu, as head of the propaganda department.

NOT IN LIMELIGHT  
Lu, 62, who headed the central committee propaganda department throughout the 17-year history of the Chinese People's Republic, has not been seen in public or mentioned in the Chinese press for about four months, during which period the cultural purge has been at its height.

A veteran Communist whose party membership dates from 1924, Lu became culture minister in January last year.

Tao, the man listed in his place by New China news agency, is a 60-year-old vice-premier believed to be rising fast within the Communist party.

A stocky figure with silvery-grey hair, cropped short, Tao is one of the chief organizers of the intensive campaign to foster study of Mao Tse-tung's written works and apply them to every phase of national life.

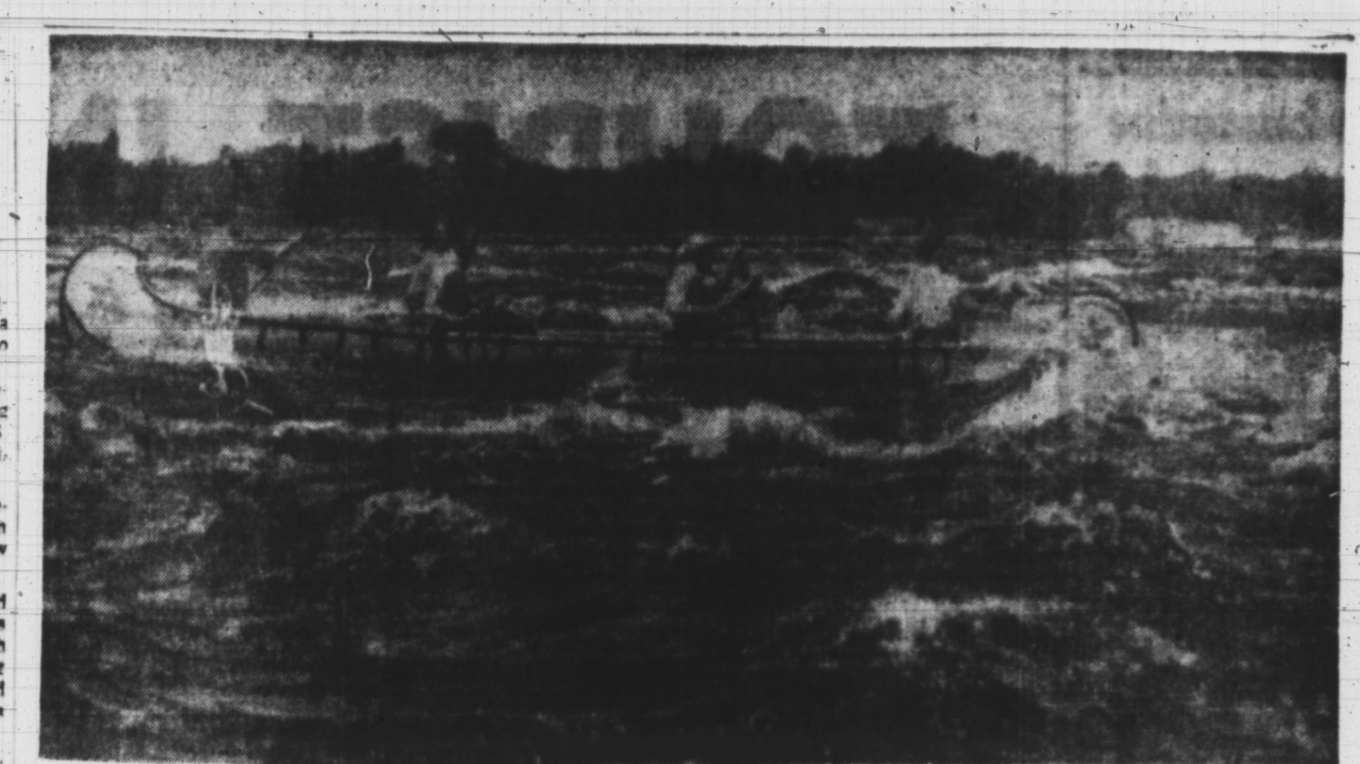

### Klan Members Are Sentenced

ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — U.S. District Judge William A. Rouselet, Jr. sentenced two Ku Klux Klan members Saturday to 10 years in prison for crimes against Negroes.

The charges arose from the slaying in 1964 of Lemuel A. Penn, a 49-year-old Negro educator, killed by shotgun fire near Athens as he was returning to his home in Washington, D.C. from army reserve training at Fort Benning, Ga.

Sims and Myers were acquitted about two months after the shooting of state charges that they murdered Penn.

The verdicts were read Friday night at the end of two consecutive trials of Sims, Myers, and four other Klansmen, all charged with conspiring to violate the civil rights of Negroes. The other four were acquitted.

It was the longest period of confinement he could impose on the two Joseph Howard Sims, 41, and Cecil W. Myers, 26, under a 1950 U.S. law that formed the basis of their convictions. Rouselet could have fined each \$5,000 in addition.
