A TRIP TO ENGLAND.

Rev. Mr. Warren's lecture in Grace Church last evening was a capital effort, and was highly appreciated by those who heard it. His subject was "A Trip to England," and the discourse throughout was of the most interesting and instructive character. The lecture was illustrated by a number of stereopticon views projected by Mr. Doull, which lent an additional interest to the descriptive matter. At the close of his lecture Rev. Mr. Warren was tendered a vote of thanks, to which he made an appropriate reply. The vote was proposed by Hon. D. Farquharson and seconded by Mr. A. Down. The lecture was under the auspices of the Epworth League, of Grace Church. Rev. W. J. Kirby presided.

NEWS NOTES.

The Indian trouble in Minnesota arose, as in many other instances, from the dishonesty and greed of United States officials. Where Indians are fairly treated, and the promises made to them kept, they give no serious trouble, as the experience of the Dominion shows.

Lord Strathcona has secured the consent of the war office for the Canadian producers of canned goods, meats, fruits and evaporated vegetables in cans or tins, to tender for supplying the army. Samples of Canadian products must be sent over for the qualities to be tested.

An item from Wolfville has been going the rounds of the press, in respect to a valuable mineral, Wolfram, said to have been discovered near Wolfville. This is a valuable and rare ore, used for making colors fast, and as an alloy for tempering steel. If the report be true, it will be of great value.

The recent death of Lieutenant Keating, who was killed while leading an expedition to subdue a mutiny in the Niger region, is another Canadian contribution to the long list of British officers who have fallen in the path of duty. Young Keating's father is now manager of the Toronto street railway, and was formerly city engineer of Toronto, and before that city engineer of Halifax.

Robert Starr of Wolfville has received considerable praise for his excellent selection of Nova Scotia fruit, which was sent to the exhibition at Omaha by the Fruit Growers' Association. About 50 varieties of apples were sent, all of which were large and highly colored. One apple, the "Chebucto Beauty," weighed 25 ounces, and was 13 inches in circumference. Another, the "Orange Apple," measured 14 inches round and weighed 19 ounces. The exhibit of Canadian fruit was a surprise to the western people, and removed some erroneous opinions as to the severity of this climate.

The United States naval authorities have a new difficulty to settle. It was only after much correspondence that the ancient practice of naming a battleship by the breaking of a bottle of wine on its prow was maintained against the assaults of the W C T U who wanted a vase of water used, and a number of prejudiced Kentuckians who counted whiskey the proper fluid with which to honor such an occasion. Now come the Milwaukee brewers with a proposition that at the launch of the Wisconsin next month beer shall be the beverage destroyed. Beer is claimed to be as distinctly a Wisconsin product as whiskey is a Kentucky or water a Maine drink. The issue is yet in doubt, and the country waits expectant.

The loss is a heavy one at this season, but nothing daunted, although there was no insurance, another one on the same principle is being erected.

WAY FARE.

The Yukon seems to occupy in Canada the position of Ireland to Great Britain in its capacity for ruining reputations. Dr H A Bonnar, of Chesley, Ont., has returned to civilization with a grievance, and a great willingness to give full vent to it. He was the defeated Liberal candidate for North Bruce at the last Dominion election, and got the appointment of surgeon in the party which went to the Yukon with Major Walsh. Apparently they did not agree, for on arriving in Dawson, Dr Bonnar resigned his post and took up a claim on Huoker Creek. He says: A mistake was made in appointing Major Walsh to the important position of commissioner of that country; he had no capacity whatever for the position he occupied; he is a man of very limited ability but unlimited conceit. Taken as a whole he was in every way unfitted for a position he occupied, and it was a fortunate thing for the country as well as for the Government that he resigned from the office he should never have been appointed to fulfil.
