CANADIAN SINGER GIVING PERFORMANCE FOR NIXON AT THE WHITE HOUSE PROTESTS AGAINST THE WAR IN INDOCHINA

WASHINGTON, January 30. — "Stop the killings in Indochina" read a banner which was suddenly unfurled in the White House by singer Carol Feraci, who was performing with the Ray Conniff Orchestra at a ceremony attended by President Richard Nixon at which the editor of the reactionary magazine Reader's Digest was presented with the Medal of Freedom.

Carol Feraci, a 30-year-old Canadian citizen, whipped the banner out of her blouse and waved it in front of Nixon in an act of protest never before seen in the White House. Then she stepped to the front of the stage without being stopped by the Security guards and addressed the President and his 150 guests: "Mr. President, stop the bombing of human beings, animals and vegetation. You go to church on Sundays and pray to Jesus Christ. If Jesus Christ were in this hall tonight, you wouldn't dare drop another bomb."

Then she expressed her support for anti-war priests Philip and Daniel Berrigan — now on trial for their anti-war activities —

and Daniel Ellsberg, indicted for having made public the Pentagon Papers.

The singer was removed from the hall by Security agents.

In statements to the press, she explained that she had been planning the protest ever since she accepted the job with the orchestra. "When they called the first time and offered the job, I said I wouldn't go to the White House to sing for someone who was burning and killing people. Then I thought it over and decided I could be an instrument through which the anguish of the Vietnamese people could be heard. I called back and accepted the job."

Carol Feraci said that the statements attributed to Martha Mitchell, wife of U.S. Secretary of Justice John Mitchell, to the effect that the singer "should be broken limb from limb" were "incredible." In closing, the singer said she wasn't worried about the effects of her action — if it should mean the end of her singing career, "I can make a living as a waitress, if need be."
