It was the former territory of Arizona, now known as the Grand Canyon state, or as some folks say, the Valentine State.

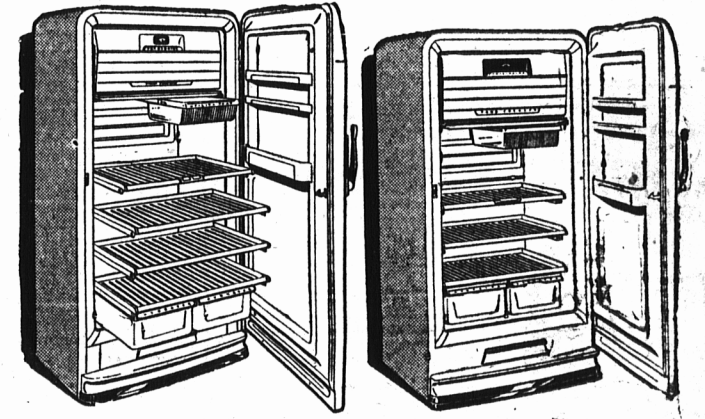
FAR FROM HOME
